

## 'Simon Kenton' to play June 26, 27, 28 and 29

The Nicholas County Bicentennial Commission has announced that an original outdoor drama will be presented June 26, 27, 28 and 29 at Blue Licks Battlefield State Park. Current time will be 8:30 p.m. each evening.

The new production, Simon Kenton, represents the first time that Nicholas County has undertaken to produce an outdoor drama. The historical drama is being presented in conjunction with the county's 175th anniversary and the Commonwealth's Bicentennial celebration to be held in Carlisle June 23-30.

The show highlights the character of the rugged and famous frontiersman, Simon Kenton. Primarily, it centers around his involvement with the military forces of Gen. George Rogers Clark and his movements within the Central Kentucky area.

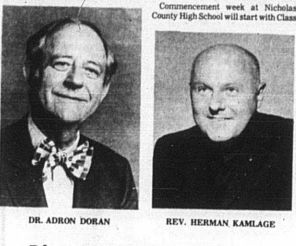
All entries must be mailed. Those brought to the County Agent's office in person will not be accepted.

Commencement week at Nicholas County High School will start with Class Night Thursday, May 23, at 8 p.m. A graduating class of 70 students will be honored during the week.

The students planned Class Night, according to Huey Corcoran, principal. The Valedictorian and the Salutatorian will address the students on Class Night. However, these award winners will not be formally announced until that evening.

The Rev. Herman Kamlage, pastor of the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, will be the speaker at Baccalaureate Service on Sunday, May 26, at 2 p.m. His topic will be "Class Motto."

Father Kamlage was ordained June 1, 1957 after completing his seminary studies at St. Paul Seminary, St. Paul, Minn. He obtained his master's degree from the University of Cincinnati in 1962 and his Ph.D. from Northwestern University in 1966. He taught at Thomas More College before coming to Carlisle in 1968.

Dr. Adron Doran, president of Morehead State University, will speak at the Commencement exercises on May 28 at 8 p.m.

Dr. Doran is a minister of the Church of Christ, served the Kentucky House of Representatives four times, and is past president of the Kentucky Education Association.

He is presently a member of the Southern Kentucky Education Board. He has participated in numerous local, state and national organizations, and has been recognized for civic and educational achievements many times.

Awards Day is scheduled for the last day of classes on May 28. There is no school for students on May 29. Report cards will be distributed on May 30, and school dismissed for the year on that day.

## Store and home robbed in county

The Bartlett Grocery store was held up and robbed by an armed gunman Monday afternoon. Also three residences in the same neighborhood had been entered and robbed earlier, Sheriff Hesse Snoot reported.

Sheriff Snoot said Reynolds Price, who owns the Bartlett Grocery, and one customer were in the store about 12 p.m. when an unmasked man walked in, opened a 38-caliber sub-compact revolver at Price and told him, "Open the cash register and give me your money."

Price said he complied and the bandit fled to a car outside the store in which another man was waiting for him and the two drove away.

Price estimated that his loss was about \$10. Neither he nor the customer was threatened further, Price told the sheriff. The store owner gave the sheriff a general description of the men and their car and estimated the two men were between 19 and 22 years old.

Sheriff Snoot said the two men were believed to have been connected with the burglary a short time earlier of three homes in the Headquarters area while their occupants were away.

Life and money in the two homes were reported taken from the home of Walter Hollar, a radio and a large amount of medicines from the residence of Raymond Green. Two radios and two television sets were taken from the Eugene Gates home. Also the Gates dog which was tied was shot and killed.

No estimate of the total value of the stolen items was made.

On Tuesday morning an abandoned car was found in Bourbon county bearing Woodford county license plates Sheriff Snoot and Mr. Price were investigating and had not returned by press time.

## Post Office to issue food stamps

Nicholas county's post office will begin issuing food stamps to eligible Nicholas county residents on June 1. The Department for Human Resources announced today.

Mrs. Gail S. Hawker, Commissioner of the Bureau for Social Insurance, said the new food stamp booklet and program will provide more efficient and more convenient service to recipients than the old commodity food program, which is being phased out nationwide.

Nicholas is one of five Kentucky counties that this month is joining the state's 110 counties already using the Food Stamp Program.

The Food Stamp Program enables low-income households to buy more food, of a greater variety, to improve their diets. Participants pay a small amount of money, based on family size and net monthly income, and receive a larger value of food stamps, which can be spent like money in participating food stores.

Standard for participation in the Food Stamp Program is the same for everyone without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, or political beliefs.

Only those whose applications have been approved will be eligible to buy the stamps June 1. To apply, stop by the local Bureau for Social Insurance office on Chestnut Street, or call for an appointment at 289-3335.

## Utility rates to increase

Kentucky Utilities Company, under Kentucky Statutes, will place new electric rates in effect May 15. These rates will represent an average increase of 13.1% in the cost of electric service over those currently charging.

Under the new schedule, an average urban residential customer of KU will experience an increase in the cost of his service of less than six cents per day.

The Company requested authorization from the Public Service Commission of Kentucky to place the new rates in effect last Dec. 15 and the Commission suspended the rates until May 15.

Since the Commission has not reached a final conclusion with respect to this case, in accord with Kentucky Statutes, KU is placing the rates in effect pending a final Commission decision. Any amounts collected in excess of the rates ultimately allowed by the Commission will be subject to refund in accordance with the Commission's final order.

KU serves about 226,000 customers in 26 Kentucky counties.
