

### Council tables discussion on proposed water line

Don Lykins of Paris announced Council Monday night with a request that the City water line be extended to the property of Bill Hillander to be used by subdivision L-1000 proposed to develop. The estimated cost, according to Mayor Bill Foy, to run the line would be in the neighborhood of \$50,000. Lykins proposes to develop 60 acres of the 100-acre tract with 125 homes resulting from \$22,000 to \$24,000. Within five years the other 120 acres would be developed for more expensive homes. The distance the line would travel, starting at the Nursing Home, would be 1.3 miles.

Council tabled the matter until a cost-investing can be set up within the next few weeks.

An ordinance was passed by Council, after first setting aside the reading

rules for an emergency situation. The ordinance will forbid parking on the south curb of the street from the corner of Walnut and Main to the east corner of the Armory. The curb will be painted yellow.

A resolution was passed to purchase a radio for the police department. The cost of the radio to the City will be \$40. The remaining 75% will be paid with Federal funds. A portable radar will be put into use within the next two weeks. The City is buying a radio, which will be used on a rental/buy basis for \$50 per month. The total purchase price is \$900. The radio is accurate for one mile in any direction.

The following amounts were transferred from the Revenue Account, reducing its total to \$48,109.05: \$5,830 to Bond and Interest; \$1,018 to Trash; \$1,250 to Meter Deposits; \$10,000 to City Employees; \$10,000 to Bond Operations and Maintenance.

his purchase of a new trash truck for City collection.

Every once of a while a recipe comes along that is almost too easy, simple and good to be true. This is the case with the recipe for Kay's Kitchen. The recipe is sent to me by Helen Harris several weeks or more ago. Since getting it I have tried making the biscuits several ways and each time it comes out so good to me. Really I'm not sure if they should be called biscuits or rolls. You take your choice. I've made them to resemble both. Helen, I simply tried the dough thinner, cut with a bit larger butter cutter, dipped them in melted butter and folded over as for pocketbook rolls and baked as usual.

When ready to make out the biscuits, take all the dough and knead on a floured board until smooth. It doesn't need a lot of working. Roll out as for regular biscuits and cut with biscuit cutter and place on a greased cookie sheet. Bake only number of biscuits desired at 425 degree or hot oven for 13 minutes or until golden. They will be baked immediately.

With remaining dough roll out, roll on a greased board, rolling, lift and freeze. When frozen remove to plastic bag and keep frozen. Use the biscuits as necessary, freezing both sides before baking. Biscuits
