Postmaster John Anderson has announced that food stamps may be purchased from the Carlisle post office starting June 3 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

When buying food stamps you must bring your ID and ATP cards and cash. No personal checks will be accepted. The ID cards must be signed upon receipt, however the ATP cards must be signed in the presence of the postal clerk.

He will be present from 1 p.m. until 3 p.m.

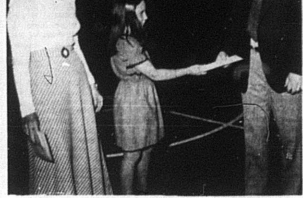
Wins \$1000 scholarship for graduate study

Radios, tv's, cameras recovered for Barterville residents

According to Sheriff Beese Smoot and Deputy J.W. Ecton the following is an account of the recovery of most of the stolen items taken from three residences in the Barterville section of the county on the afternoon of May 13. This was the same day Reynolds Price, owner of the Barterville Grocery, was robbed in his store of approximately \$100 by an unmasked gunman who had an accomplice waiting outside in a car.

Items stolen were two television sets and two radios from the home of Ed Gallo of Bald Hill Road; Radio, camera and large amount of medicine from Raymond Green's home on Selwell Road; and five rifles and shotguns and three pistols from the home of Walter Holter. The three were not at home at the time of the robbery.

On Tuesday, May 14 at 9 a.m. the Sheriff's office received a call from the Bourbon County Sheriff's office in Paris reporting that an abandoned 1971 Ford with Woodford county license plate, had been pulled in from the Tarr Road just outside Paris. Smoot and Ecton were accompanied to Paris by Mr. Green and the customer in the store at the time of the robbery to identify the car. Detective Dudley of the Kentucky State Police discovered part of the loot in the car, which had been stolen from Paul Miller Ford in Lexington on Monday. It was assumed the car was abandoned due to a blow-out of a front tire.
