Kay's Kitchen

Spring time is with us and we need to think of different foods and to put a bit of springtime into our meals. Naturally I think of lamb. Why don't you give it a try. It is so delicious as the market now. Lamb shoulder is more economical than leg of lamb or chops. So try shoulder in this recipe of Curry of Lamb. It may be made in the morning or anytime and reheated at mealtime giving you time to work in the garden or to do any one of the many chores that are calling us at this time.

CURRY OF LAMB
2 lb. lean lamb, cut into 1 inch cubes and trimmed of fat
1 quart water
1 pepper corn
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon thyme
2 sprigs fresh parsley
1 medium onion, chopped
1 large apple, peeled and cubed
1 tablespoon butter
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 teaspoon curry, or to taste
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup onion
1/4 cup seedless green grapes
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup oil
1/4 cup vinegar
1/4 cup ketchup
1/4 cup catsup
1/4 cup mustard
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1/4 cup soy sauce
1/4 cup tomato paste
1/4 cup ketchup
1/4 cup catsup
1/4 cup mustard
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1/4 cup soy sauce

Green peas always are good to serve with lamb. Chutney is a nice accompaniment.

A nice fruit salad is good to serve with lamb so try to make one.

ORANGE SALAD
1 pkg. orange flavored gelatin
1 cup boiling water
1 cup grapefruit
1 cup well-drained orange sections
1/4 cup seedless green grapes
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup oil
1/4 cup vinegar
1/4 cup ketchup
1/4 cup catsup
1/4 cup mustard
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1/4 cup soy sauce
1/4 cup tomato paste

Crème margarine and sugar will add flavor and moisten. Add 1/4 cup butter and blend well. Stir in cereal, nuts, dates and vanilla.

Four minutes and cool in sink sheet. Bake 375 degrees until lightly brown. Serve in covered container.

Now you have a complete meal, all prepared ahead of time.

This is on a completely different thought. With the price of food so high, please don't give up entertaining your friends. You don't have to do the first major recipe. Just think how much fun you can have serving hamburgers' buffet style. All you need is a platter of well cooked, (I mean charcoal broiled in different stages of doneness) hamburgers, garnished with parsley. Hot buttered toasted buns, a tossed salad of Bibb lettuce and oil and vinegar dressing, a platter of sliced tomatoes, onions and pickle slices, and a bowl of potato chips.

Have plenty of condiments like catsup, mayonnaise, mustard, horseradish, meat sauce and let everybody fix their own. If you have pleasant company, that is all that matters. If your guests are not congenial it would not make any difference whether you served the party well or not.

Don't forget a pie or cake to top the meal. You think about spaghetti dinners and chili suppers.

QUICK DATE COOKIES
1 1/2 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup margarine
1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs
2 cups oats
2 cups chopped pecans
1 cup flaked dates
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Mix (baking powder and salt.

Cover meat in 1 quart of boiling water. Add pepper corn, salt, thyme, and parsley. Simmer until tender.

Sauté onion in butter until golden and add apple. Stir in flour and brown slightly, then add curry. Add to meat mixture stirring constantly until thickened. Taste for seasoning. Add lemon juice, rind, grapes and coconut.

Serve on chop plate surrounded by rice.

Following the presentation of diplomas and the conferring of the Associate of Arts Degree the Rev. presented the Scholarship Awards.

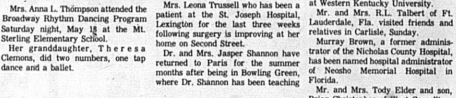
