Small game season re-opens Nov. 21

With the first part of the squirrel and dove seasons ending on Oct. 31, hunters are reminded that small game season will not begin until Nov. 21. During this three-week period, hunters may not take any species of wildlife, protected or unprotected, with the following exceptions: The archery deer season will be open through Nov. 15, and special deer hunts will be held on specified dates at certain

wildlife management areas. The statewide goose season will open Nov. 12 and the first part of the statewide duck season will begin at noon Nov. 30 and continue through Nov. 28. The "shake-out" season on opossum and raccoon which opened Oct. 22 will continue through midnight, Nov. 30. During this time opossum and raccoon may be taken only by traps or by hand, and hunters may not have any type of weapon in their possession.

Health Planning Council expands services to Nicholas

The Comprehensive Health Planning Council of the Kentucky Department

for Human Resources has approved an application from the Bluegrass Regional Birth Planning Council, Inc., Lexington, to expand its services to include Clark, Lincoln and Nicholas counties. This action was taken after a public review of the project conducted at Frankfort on Oct. 18. This proposal and application are subject to the provisions of Section 112 of the Social Security Act, which was intended to assure that federal funds are not used to support unnecessary capital expenditures for health care facilities.

ROTC scholarships available at MSU

Opportunities for high school seniors, both men and women, to receive four-year Army ROTC college scholarships have been announced by Lt. Col. Gordon reports that 1,000 scholarships will be awarded this year. In addition to providing full tuition and funds for textbooks and laboratory fees, the grants also provide a monthly stipend in the amount of \$100. Upon graduation, each scholarship winner is commissioned a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army and expected to serve four years on active duty.

The application period for scholarships ends this Dec. 31. Applications may be obtained by writing, before Dec. 1, to Army ROTC Scholarships, P.O. Box 4021, Lexington, Ky. 40511. Selection of scholarship winners is based on results of American College Testing Program (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) exams, his or her high school academic record, participation in athletic and other extracurricular activities, a physical examination and interviews with a board of Army officers.

Applicants must be at least 17 years old by Oct. 1 of the year in which the scholarship becomes effective and be able to complete all requirements for commission and college degree before reaching age 25.
