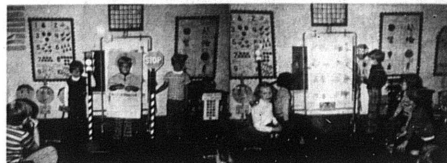

Hunters asked to register

Rabbit and quail hunters using the Higdon-Henry Wildlife Area near Morgantown in Union County during the 1974-75 hunting season will be asked to check in prior to hunting and check out when the hunt is completed. A check station will be operated in the former school building located 1,000 feet east of the junction of state highways 94 and 144.

A special research study, conducted by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources at this area, will continue for the next several years. An attempt will be made to evaluate present management practices on the area and a complete tally of the rabbit and quail harvest is necessary.

Signs have been erected at the most frequented access points to remind hunters of the new procedure. The rabbit and quail hunting season runs from Nov. 20 through Dec. 4 and continues from Dec. 12 through Feb. 28. Daily bag limit is six and the possession limit, after two or more days of hunting, is 12.

Kay's Kitchen

It is definitely soup time. Simmer slowly, season with care and be creative. It is true, good soup can be made with left over beef steaks, vegetables etc., but one delicious soup is also made from a good recipe.

A good soup served with a salad, a good bread, cheese and a dessert can be a meal guests can enjoy. To make it an even more festive occasion serve a light dry wine, either red or white but not too dry.

CHEEKY GUMBO
To make chicken stock put in large soup pot:
1 stewing hen
2 medium carrots (cut in two)
2 medium onions, quartered
1 small onion
3 quarts water
salt to taste
Cook all ingredients two or three hours, removing chicken when tender. Drain the stock through a fine sieve. Chill stock so fat may be easily removed.
Melt 1 tablespoon butter in heavy saucepan. Add 1 medium onion, chopped, and 1 green pepper, chopped, and cook until limp but not brown. Add this to the chicken stock and 1/2 lb. of cubed, cooked ham, 1/8 lb. 303 can corn or pea, frozen. Use using the frozen stock when fresh is not available. 3 tablespoons uncooked rice, 1 cup of celery cut in pieces, 2 bay leaves and a pinch of thyme, several pepper corns, 1 can tomatoes. Cook slowly for about an hour. Cut chicken into bite size or larger pieces and add to soup. Remove bay leaves.
You may thicken soup slightly if you wish by adding a little cornstarch and water paste. The addition of barley will thicken soup slightly. Keep some on hand for other soups. The amount used depends on how thick you like it and how much you are making. Cook practice. When done taste for seasoning.

OLD FASHIONED POTATO SOUP
4 cups diced raw potatoes
1 cup chopped celery (not too fine)
2 cups chopped onion
2 strips of bacon, cut into 1/2 inch strips
2 cups whole milk
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup of cubed, cooked ham
salt and pepper to taste
Cut potatoes, celery, onion and bacon in 1/2 inch square pieces. Add other vegetables are tender. Drain and save liquid. Add 1 cup milk, butter, salt, pepper and parsley stems. Allow soup to barely simmer a few minutes to blend flavors. Remove parsley stems. Use reserved liquid to make thickening, and add to soup stirring constantly until desired thickness. Use rest of liquid to stretch soup if needed. Use chopped parsley leaves for garnish when soup is served.
Remember potato soup does not age or freeze. However, it can be made in the morning to be used for the evening meal.
