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Thanksgiving Community Service

The Nicholas County Ministerial Association will hold its annual Community Thanksgiving Service at the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church on Wednesday, Nov. 27, at 7:30 p.m.

Rev. Lawrence W. Helman, Chaplain at the University of Kentucky Catholic Newman Center, will be the guest speaker.

This year the plans for the offering are somewhat different. Canned meats, vegetables, soups and fruits are being requested by the Ministerial Association. These canned goods will be stored at the First Baptist Church for a community food closet. When there is a need, the ministers of the community can go to the food closet and obtain food for a family.

Because of food and drug laws, home canned foods may not be accepted. Monetary donations will also be accepted to purchase food supplies. The offering will be brought forward at the offering time of the service.

Estil Naffziger, Nicholas County Extension Agent, and Joe Smiley, Extension Tobacco Specialist, were speakers at the Nicholas County annual Tobacco Festival held Thursday at the Carlisle Armory.

Naffziger noted that there are 900 tobacco allotments in Nicholas county with a total of four and one-half million pounds, which brings in \$4 million to Nicholas county farmers.

Fifty-one exhibitors made 141 entries.

Curtsinger attends 4-H Leaders Forum

Bobby Curtsinger, Carlisle, was one of 28 Kentucky 4-H leaders who attended the National 4-H Leaders Forum which was held Oct. 27-Nov. 1 in Washington, D.C.

The week-long conference conducted at the National 4-H Center, offered leadership training and educational experiences. Program highlights included an "idea fair," 4-H program exhibits from each state, social workshops on working with youth, and group discussions. Curtsinger served as chairman of the Kentucky 4-H display.

A day on Capitol Hill display afforded opportunities for each state delegate to visit their Congressional and Senator, view hearings and tour the Capitol. Educational and cultural tours included the Library of Congress, Folger Shakespeare Library, National Collection of Fine Arts, National Cathedral, Shrine of Immaculate Conception, Ford's Theater and a play at the Executive Theater.

These 4-H leaders were selected to represent their state 4-H programs and they will be sharing their leadership experiences with others through county, area and statewide training programs.

Nonquota tobacco grown in quota areas may be penalized in 1975

"Tobacco growers in Nicholas county will be interested in a new Federal law designed to preserve for farmers the effectiveness of growing tobacco under the quota and price support program. To do this the new law provides that next year quota restrictions and marketing penalties will be used to discourage growing nonquota tobacco in quota areas." Mr. Hall reported.

"Beginning with the 1975 crop," Hall said, "nonquota tobacco crops located in areas where tobacco farmers have chosen to comply with the quota and price support programs will be inspected according to classification standards of quota types of tobacco." Hall stated, "An example of nonquota tobacco is Maryland, type 22. It may be treated as burley quota tobacco, if it was produced in a burley quota tobacco area, and if quota tobacco characteristics are in evidence in it. Similarly, when a Maryland tobacco crop produced in a blue-cured area and harvested and cured as blue-cured tobacco, if the characteristics are evident, it will be treated as blue-cured tobacco. When such tobacco is sold in marketing penalties and quota restrictions may be applied on any marketed excess."

The law relative to the new tobacco classification is PL 93-411, passed last September amending the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, Hall said.

Kincaid doubles charitable gift

Garvie Kincaid, prominent Lexington businessman, announced Monday that he will make a charitable donation of \$200,000 next month to public service agencies in central and southeastern Kentucky.

Kincaid gave \$100,000 last year to charitable organizations in gifts ranging from \$10,000 to \$500 in doubling the amount this year, he will be joined by an organization he heads, Kentucky Group Bank, which has pledged a portion of the money.

The philanthropy, one of the largest ever made in central Kentucky through one individual, was announced at a luncheon at Spottedtop Hall, attended by executives of Kentucky Group Bank and media representatives. H.A. Smith, vice president of the trust department of Central Bank and Trust Company, Lexington, will handle distribution of this year's contribution and serve as coordinator of the distribution in late December.

Smith urged "all worthy organizations to let us know their needs as soon as possible."

"In making allocations, we will respond to all deserving agencies in a meeting genuine human needs which are handicapped by inadequate funds," Smith declared.
