Farmers asked to make nominations for ASC committeemen elections

Farmers are asked to nominate candidates of their choice to be on the ASC Community committee ballot, says Paul E. Hall.

The ASC Community committee election will be conducted from Nov. 22 to Dec. 2, by mail ballot. The Four ASC communities in Nicholas county are: A—Headquarters and Bartlettville; B—Ellenville and Myers; C—Morefield and East Union; and D—Carlisle and Park.

ASC committees are responsible for managing government farm programs on the local level. To meet the needs of individual producers, ASC committee members must be concerned and responsible individuals, Mr. Hall said. Eight hundred and eighty county farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve the farm community. Farmers will soon receive petition forms by mail and may begin submitting them to the county ASCS office on Oct. 3.

A few basic considerations should be kept in mind when circulating petitions. Mr. Hall said. In order to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must be signed by at least three eligible farm voters in the farm area and for air pockets in the county ASCS office no later than Oct. 29.

A farmer may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as he chooses. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the ASC committee election may contact the county ASCS office for full details, including eligibility requirements for officeholders.

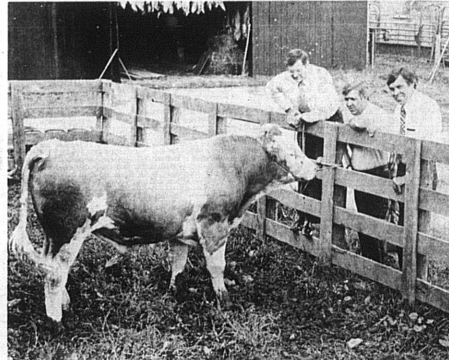
In 1964, when BGI became a corporation, approximately 364 persons were employed at the Carlisle and Mt. Sterling plants. Since then, the company has grown to 2200 employees at five locations. 600 are employed at BGI and 700 employed at BlueGrass Knitting here in Carlisle.

Four employee benefit improvements were announced by Shumate during the luncheon: 1. Increase in pension and life insurance benefits; 2. Across the board wage increase of 3% effective Dec. 1; 3. Four weeks paid vacation for 15 years of service; 4. Doubled company contributions to the matching funds paid sick-leave program—"Helping Hand Fund."
