He also wants the governor to take off the additional two cents on the gasoline tax that was put on in the governor's request. DeMarcus doesn't want a special session to allocate the money for more spending because he says the legislature as to it now constituted is controlled by the governor.

It seems the campaign supporters in each camp are really doing more talking than the candidates about the real issues in the campaign. It will be just another month before the campaign ends, and then we can get back to the real issues facing the people. How to make a living in a spiraling one-way economy. Prices are going up, faster than earnings, are income.

But anyone ought to know that the governor certainly isn't going to call a special session a month before the election because that would be the perfect forum for DeMarcus and other Republicans to get in their campaign speeches for the Republican candidate. Besides, that would take the governor off of the campaign trail for a month or two weeks and he certainly doesn't want to do that at this critical stage of his
