Goes into closed session Called Council meet held Monday to discuss employee problems

A called meeting of City Council was held Monday to discuss employee problems. After a closed session, Councilman postponed action on employee matters until its regular meeting Monday, Oct. 14, at 7 p.m. Written request for the meeting was made to Mayor Bill Power by Councilmen Julian Green, Yeach Berry, Calvin Willis and Alex Crawford. The first motion was to hold the meeting without pay to Councilman Curtis Wood. The motion passed 5-1 with Clarence Wood voting against.

Announcement of receipt of a \$6,964 revenue sharing check was made by Mayor Power.

Other motions passed included: —to pay blacktopping of streets from revenue sharing and streets and alley fees to avoid interest charges, then reimburse streets and alleys and pay state money as received after final approval of streets is obtained.

the matter before the city council Monday night and report at the next regular board meeting Nov. 2 for official action.

The two groups were without legal counsel in the matter at this stage of the negotiations since City Attorney Tom Hopkins also serves as legal counsel for the school board.

The board met with Power before getting down to regular business, but not until they had heard a complaint from a Carlisle citizen concerning a bus route.

The parent in question had asked the school if the bus could enter his lane to pick up his children instead of having them walk to the bus stop.

Supt. Donald Elder recommended that the request be denied saying it would deviate from bus routes established before the school year could start a precedent and have everyone whose children had to walk a distance to the bus stop ask for that treatment also.

In other business the board approved use of the gym by the Carlisle Jaycees for their Little League basketball program. The dates will be set as not to conflict with scheduled events.

The salaries of several Rank II and III teachers were raised in concern with the state minimum. The salary schedule, which was composed when the teachers were hired, had failed to do so.

Average Daily Attendance contracts for non-resident students were signed. Each county in the state usually has several students, who for geographic reasons primarily, attend school in districts outside their county. However, these students were counted for ADA purposes in the county which they reside. The school system receives federal aid for each student in the school system based on ADA.

Other business decided included: —approving an insurance premium for \$1800 worth of tobacco in the barn, —hiring Mickey Hartley as bus driver #41, Bonnie Grimes as substitute teacher and Donald Smith as bus driver.
