3. Copper was also indicted for Griley Larceny of an automobile belonging to

4 & 5. Johnny Wallace Lane and James Thurman Mattingly indicted for Armond Hobbey of Bartlettville Grocery and three months of larceny and entering and taking property of value from the motor vehicle of James Green and Eugene D. Gates. Lane will be tried in February Term of Court.

Mattingly, pleaded guilty to the reduced charge of Hobbey and received the maximum sentence of ten

Called Council meet held Monday to discuss employee problems

A called meeting of City Council was held Monday night to discuss employee problems. After a closed session, Councilmen postponed action on the employee matters until its regular meeting Monday, Oct. 14, at 7 p.m.

Written request for the meeting was made to Mayor Bill Power by Councilman Julian Green, Yeach Berry, Calvin Wilks and Alex Crawford. The first motion was to hold the meeting without pay to Councilmen. The motion passed 5-1 with Clarence Cord voting against.

Announcement of receipt of a \$6,964.13 was made during the meeting.

Other motions passed included: to pay backlogging of streets from revenue sharing and streets and alleys fund to avoid interest charges; then reimburse streets and alleys fund when state money is received after final approval of streets is obtained.

the matter before the city council Monday night and report at the next regular board meeting Nov. 2 for official action.

The two groups were without legal counsel in the matter at this stage in the negotiations since City Attorney Billy Hopkins also serves as legal counsel for the school board.

The board met with Power before getting down to regular business, but not until they had heard a competing plan from a Carlisle citizen concerning a bus route.

The parent in question had asked the board if the bus could enter his lane to pick up his children instead of having them walk to the bus stop. Sgt. Donald Elder recommended that the request be denied saying it would deviate from bus routes established before the school year could start a precedent and have everyone whose children had to walk a distance to the bus stop ask for that treatment also.

In other business the board approved use of the gym by the Carlisle Jaycees for their Little League basketball program. The dates will be set as not to conflict with scheduled events.

The salaries of several Rank 11 and 111 teachers were raised to conform with the state minimum. The salary schedule, which was composed when the teachers were hired, had failed to do so.

Average Daily Attendance contracts for non-resident students were signed. (Each county in the state usually has several students who for geographic reasons primarily attend school in districts outside their county. However, these students were counted for ADA purposes in the county which they reside. The school system receives federal aid for each student in the school system based on ADA.)

Other business decided included: approving an insurance premium for \$100 worth of tobacco in the barn, buying Mickey Hartley as bus driver #41, Bonnie Grimes as substitute teacher and Donald Smith as bus driver.

Approved Barbara Hutton as girls' basketball coach. The girls' varsity team will play a schedule of 15 games. A total of 26 girls reported for training, approved use of the high school cafeteria for a dinner meeting Nov. 11 for the Junior Women's Club and the Community Women's Club.

Approved, in early June, for Charity Griffith to resign, Jan. 21, 1975, approved in order to be able to bid to sell a Chevrolet pickup truck, and changed the time of the board meetings to 7 p.m. effective Saturday, Nov. 2.
