

'Interim Committees meet to hear from people' says State Representative Adrian Arnold

Urging public support of the interim committee system, Representative Adrian Arnold, D.M.E. Sterling, said: "The legislature cannot pass good legislation without the people's help. Interim committees meet to hear from individuals and groups, who have ideas or information about a particular legislative proposal."

In a recent interview, Rep. Arnold talked about his two interim committees and their importance to the people of his district. He is a member of the Agriculture and Natural Resources committee, and the Counties committee. "Many proposals will come up at committee meetings throughout the interim, which will directly affect the

people of Bath, Montgomery, Nicholas and Fleming counties. We need their participation now, while we have time to study and research the proposed legislation before the 1975 session of the General Assembly."

A bill which would prohibit large corporations from unduly influencing the price of farm products has failed the last two sessions. On Oct. 21, a

subcommittee on Agriculture will meet in Room 327 of the State Capitol at 10 a.m. to discuss this bill and other legislation of interest to farmers.

Rep. Arnold is vice chairman of the subcommittee, which will also be discussing a marketing plan completed by the Governor's Council on Agriculture. The report indicates that broad agricultural areas which should be considered in expanding the state's agricultural income. One of the proposals is to grow more small grains to help increase the livestock industry in central Kentucky.

A representative from the state Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Protection will be at the meeting to discuss the legislators' concern over restricted use of pesticides by farmers. The subcommittee will also hear a report from a special subcommittee on tobacco marketing. They will discuss the results of a study on the sale of tobacco in Kentucky.

Counties committee

The Counties committee plans to study sewerage problems related to open drainage, and establishing sewers in rural areas. They also plan to review the need for a certificate of title law in Kentucky. "We are the only state in the Union without an auto title law," said Rep. Arnold, "and this often results in our state becoming a 'dumping ground' for stolen automobiles."

In the area of local government, the committee plans to re-consider the county officials pay bill which failed in the last session, and establish standards for audits of county governments. They also intend to review the amount of funds available for operation of sheriff's offices, in order that legislation providing sufficient income can be proposed if necessary.

The committee plans quarterly meetings throughout the interim. Rep. Arnold is a member of the County Officials' Compensation Sub-committee, and the County Consolidation Subcommittee.

"I would like to encourage anyone with any ideas, to come and participate in these meetings," Rep. Arnold said. "If you wait until the 1975 General Assembly, there will be little time to discuss your proposals. We need to hear them now, while we can study your ideas."

The Legislative Research Commission staff will send a memorandum to all area media, telling the time, date and subject matter of all meetings.

Farmers are asked to nominate neighbors for ASCS election

Farmers are reminded that the county ASCS office is now receiving nominations for ASC Community Committee election candidates. Paul C. Hall, Executive Director, encourages farmers to use this opportunity to nominate their farm neighbors as candidates in the ASC committee election.

The ASC election will be conducted by mail from Nov. 22 to Dec. 2. Eligible voters will be provided with instructions for filling out the secret ballot and returning it to the county ASCS office.

In filling out a petition, farmers should be careful to include the name of only one nominee, the signatures of at least three eligible ASC voters who support the nominee, and certification

that the nominee is willing to serve if elected. Petitions must contain this information, without it they will not be accepted. The completed petition should be dated and mailed or hand-delivered to the county ASCS office no later than Oct. 20.

County committee elections are open to all eligible ASC voters, without regard to race, color, religion, sex or national origin. Hall explains that any concerned farmer with an interest in serving fellow producers would be an asset to the ASC. For this reason, farmers are urged to petition for the farmers of their choice. The individual producer will benefit in the long run from a responsible, concerned team of ASC commissioners in the local administration of U.S. government farm programs, Hall said.

Mrs. Norma Hogge named Ford's Women's chairman in 7th District

Mrs. Norma Hogge of Morehead has been named the Ford for U.S. Senate District Women's Chairman for the northern half of the 7th Congressional District.

In making the announcement, Senatorial Ford for Senate Women's Chairman Betty J. Denton Heck of the Paris stated that Mrs. Hogge, who served as a District Women's Chairman for Ford when he ran for Governor, "has shown that she is a

good organizer, and is always on the move. Mrs. Hogge is typical of the "Women Workers for Wendell" who are actively involved in electing Wendell Ford to the United States Senate on Nov. 5."

Betty Jo Heck announced that she has appointed District Chairmen in the women's organization in order to hear more people's voices and add an extra touch of organization to the campaign. "The women have always been effective organizers and are capable of getting out the vote," she stated.

The District Chairmen will serve as a liaison between the Ford for Senate Women's Chairmen in each county and Mrs. Heck's organization in Frankfort. The counties Mrs. Hogge will serve are Bath, Boyd, Bracken, Greenup, Lawrence, Elliott, Carter, Fleming, Lewis, Mason, Nicholas, Robertson, Montgomery, and Rowan.
