### Proclamation--UN Day--Oct. 24

OCTOBER 24, 1974

Each year the peoples of the world celebrate Oct. 24 as United Nations Day, recalling the date in 1945 when the United Nations Charter came into force. This is an appropriate occasion for people everywhere to renew their commitment to the Charter ideals of peace and human rights and their determination to promote economic and social progress and a greater measure of justice and freedom for all. This year the anniversary occurs at a time of dramatic change in world affairs. We are the promise of a more peaceful world and the opportunity for new strides in international cooperation. In the years ahead the growing interdependence of nations will inevitably require international institutions to be even more effective in dealing with this new agenda. We need to create new arrangements to control new technologies for the common good. We need to bridge the interests of rich and poor countries on matters of trade and aid.

Important steps have already been taken by the United Nations in meeting these challenges. Still greater progress is being made this year as a result of a series of international conferences beginning with the Sixth Special Session of the General Assembly on Raw Materials and Development, the first Special session ever convened to deal exclusively with economic issues.

### Frank L. Stanley Sr. dies

His career as a newspaper man and his dedication to the civil rights movement led to his drafting legislation leading to integration in the state universities by the Kentucky General Assembly in 1950.

A decade later he wrote the bill that created the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights and was an original member of that body which served as a watchdog agency for equal employment. Three years later he had become one of the members and was editor and general manager.

During the years that Stanley published the Defender, it received more than 20 awards in journalism, including the President's Special Service Award of the National Newspaper Publishers' Association (NNPA) in 1970, and the coveted Hurstman Award in 1971.

Stanley was a co-founder of the NNPA and a five-time president of that association which represents black-oriented newspapers across the country.

His syndicated column, "People, Places and Problems," received first-class honors in judging by the NNPA. He also won two editorial writing awards from that organization.

Stanley is survived by his wife, the former Vivian Clark; two sons, Frank Jr., editor of The Defender, and Kenneth, assistant publisher of The Defender; and three grandsons.

Funeral services were conducted on Tuesday, Oct. 22, at Zion Baptist Church, 2200 W. Walnut Street at 1 p.m.

**Economic predictions made for Kentucky**

FRANKFORT--No major depression hit, but economic growth in Kentucky and the nation as a whole will be "at best, sluggish" according to recent reports based at the quarterly meeting of the Kentucky Council of Economic Advisors at Frankfort.

Charles G. Hendrix, staff economist of the council, predicted the "sluggishness" of the nation's economy would reduce the rate of growth of Kentucky employment, but would not lead to an overall decline in employment.

A decline in certain industries, he said, will be offset in part by expansion in a few others. He described the coal industry as being in the beginning of a boom. "The Kentucky steel industry is another which he predicts will expand, while the furniture, clothing and appliance industry may be affected by declining consumer demand for their products.

The Kentucky consumer may be insulated from the rates of inflation elsewhere, he said, citing food market surveys made by the University of Kentucky's Office of Business Development and Government Services in Lexington and Louisville.

The survey indicates that food prices in the state have not increased as much as they have nationally, which means Kentucky has a slower rate of inflation. The market basket, developed to measure month-to-month price changes in a fixed weekly shopping list, shows a rate of increase of 3.2 percent in Louisville and a 3.4 percent in Lexington since the survey was begun in September, 1973.

A national economic forecast was made by Dr. Harold S. Charlesworth, director of research for the Office of Business Development and Government Services.
