Painter Creek road to be surfaced

Deputy Commissioner Otto Ingram of the Bureau of Highways Monday announced an addition to the 1974-75 County Road Aid Program for Nicholas county.

Acting for Transportation Secretary Billy Patton, Ingram said this addition is a joint venture between the Bureau and the Nicholas County Fiscal Court and provides for initial blacktop surfacing for 4.8 miles of the Painter Creek Road beginning at KY 1264 and extending northeast.

The County Road Aid Program is supported by the General Assembly's appropriation of \$13 million for the 1974-75 Fiscal Year. Its purpose is to help the counties of the Commonwealth meet their responsibilities for local roads.

Health Dept. becomes part of WEDCO District

On Oct. 1, 1974, Nicholas County Health Department became a part of the WEDCO District. The Wedco District Board of Health became a legal entity when the Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky announced that the Wedco District Health Department was established.

The Wedco District Board of Health appointed Dr. W.E. Davis of Bourbon county, Health Officer for Bourbon, Harrison, Scott and Nicholas counties. On Oct. 14, the Wedco District Board met at the Bourbon County Health Department to organize the District. At this meeting, Mrs. Edith Alexander, R.N., was appointed a member of the Executive Committee. Other members are Dr. Davis, chairman of the Wedco District Board of Health; the four county judges, (of which Judge Floyd Clark of this county is a member); two medical doctors, Dr. Brown Scott county and Dr. Aerial, Bourbon county; one dentist, Dr. Burnett, Harrison county; Mrs. Alexander, R.N., Nicholas county and one lay individual, Clark Cleveland, D.V.M., Scott county.

The cost of creating and establishing the district health department shall be paid by the counties comprising the district in proportion to the taxable property of each county as shown by their respective county assessments. The annual expense of maintaining and operating the district health department shall be borne by each county in proportion to the amount of the taxable property in each county.

Dr. Davis will be a Nicholas county one-half day a week, serving as Health Officer.
