The VA, with more than 200,000 employees and an annual budget of over \$13 billion, serves America's more than 20 million veterans who, together with their families and survivors of deceased veterans, comprise nearly one-half of the national population.

Born on a farm near Noblesville, Ind., Jan. 18, 1918, he received a B.S. degree from Butler University in Indianapolis in 1941. In 1960 his Alma Mater conferred on him an honorary doctor of law degree.

**Kay's Kitchen**

I have several recipes for recipes for Peppermint Jam, Jelly or butter or margarine and mayonnaise or whatever you prefer. Wrap lettuce and tomato separately, then put together at lunch time.

—Keep a supply of celery and carrot sticks prepared and ready to eat. Don't forget plenty of pickles. Keep a good supply of dill pickles, cauliflower,okra, mushroom, and bread butter and sweet milk. Wrap in a wrap that seals well when packing these for the lunch box.

—Fruits are important. When packing fruit remember to pack those that are easy to eat: peaches, plums, apples, bananas and for summer or winter a wide-mouthed thermos in various sizes. So if you are packing for either school children or an adult make it a well-balanced lunch and one that travels well.

—To help cut expenses, use small plastic containers for use for canned fruits, pickles, small snacks, candy, etc. Small sou cream and cheese containers are good for these small extras you will want to put in the lunch box or bag. I notice in the stores, paper bags with colored designs on them are available, also plastic containers for sandwiches and wedges of pie. Don't forget plastic knives, forks and spoons. Small paper plates and napkins. Small salt and pepper shakers.

—To save time make up the week's supply of sandwiches at once, label and store in freezer. They will be ready to eat by lunch time. Freeze what I read and hear, chicken, turkey, meat and peanut butter-freeze best.

Spreading bread to the very edge with butter or hot sauce prevents a moist filling from becoming soggy.

—If you want a lettuce and tomato sandwich, spread bread 1/8" butter

These Cheese Wafers, they're beautiful and are sure to have on hand, not only for the lunch box but for yourself. This recipe makes about 1 dozen wafers.

**CHEESE WAFFERS**  
2 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese  
2 sticks margarine  
2 cups flour  
2 cups crisp cereal  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup 1/2 creamer powder. Depends on how hot you want them.

Let cheese and margarine soften at room temperature. Combine all ingredients and mix well. Shape into small balls and arrange on a greased cookie sheet. Flatten with fork. Bake at 375 degrees for 10 minutes, approximately.

—Instead of using just plain margarine in making sandwiches try some of these additions to add a bit of variety: mayonnaise, butter, and spread over sandwich, top with crisp crumbled bacon.

1 cup mayonnaise  
1 tablespoon chopped chutney  
Blend and use with chicken or turkey sandwich.

1 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 teaspoon caraway seed  
Blend and use on dry bread with liverwurst, any luncheon meat or turkey sandwich.

1 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice  
1 teaspoon mustard  
Blend and spread over hard boiled egg slices. Salt to taste.

1 cup mayonnaise  
2 teaspoons dry onion soup mix  
1 teaspoon horseradish  
Blend and use for roast beef sandwiches.
