'A Party for the People' Saturday at Capital Plaza Sports Center

FRANKFORT—A Party for the People, the fundraising event for the Governor Wendell Ford's United States Senate Campaign, will be held at the Capital Plaza Sports Center in Frankfort on Saturday, Sept. 14. For the first time in modern history, all living former Democratic Kentucky Governors and Lieutenant Governors will be present in a show of support for Governor Ford.
The event will feature country recording star Tanya Tucker following her performance at approximately 8 p.m. Dinner will be served at 6:30 p.m.
Also attending and voting their support for Governor Ford in the fall's U.S. Senate race will be all of the living former Democratic Governors—Neil Breasheit, Bert Combs, Happy Chandler, Earl Clements, and Lawrence Wetherby—all living former Democratic Lieutenant Governors—Harry Lee Waterfield and Wilson Wyatt—Kentucky's five Democratic Congressmen—Carl Perkins, Ron Marshall, William Natcher, Frank Stubblefield, and John Brockridge—and Kentucky Democratic U.S. Senator Walter "Doc" Holloman.

Outstanding young men for 1974

Successful completion of a leakage control project this summer at Dix Dam was announced Friday by the Kentucky Utilities Company.
The dam inspection and leakage grouting operation which took much of the month of August reduced the leakage from a reading of 119 cubic feet a second to three cubic feet a second at the lake elevation of 219 feet.
Since water in Herrington Lake means electric power to 25 counties, reducing the leakage from the amount of water lost through the dam in the spring to the relative trickle shown in the latest measurements is the equivalent of conserving electricity worth approximately \$200,000 a year, which will mean an ultimate savings of that magnitude to electric utilities.
Seventy-six dives were made for inspection and as part of the repair work during the period of August 7 to August 15. The work crew consisted of four men on a barge with two divers and five men on the ground party.
The project was first planned for last year but late November rainfall raised the lake to a level which prevented the full spawning period in early May. Dropping the lake level to the spawning and early fall operation, it was explained, might have resulted in drying up the spawn and seriously interfering with fish production in Herrington Lake.
In early March, after making a public announcement and notifying contractors, KUC started lowering the lake over a six-week period to 72 feet, about 17 feet below normal April elevation. This was reached on April 28 and was lowered only about another three feet during the next 20 days.
The diving company arrived on May 15 and started setting up the barges and other support equipment for the first dive on June 5.
Divers were lowered in a cage to the bottom of the dam and made a complete inspection of the bottom of the dam since it was constructed in the mid-1920's.
The divers made a thorough inspection of the entire dam and found it in good structural condition, but inspection revealed the dam from being further damaged over a period of years by the sizeable leaks through the large holes in the face of the dam. The leaks were concentrated on the far east wing of the dam on the Garrard county side.
Sealing a leak involved stuffing a large cloth bag into the hole. Into the bag concrete "grout" was pumped from the top of the dam. The bag expanded and conformed to the shape of the hole and sealed the leak. Once the grout set up, a permanent seal was produced. The process was repeated for each leak.
A total of 199 bags was used with the largest being 16 feet and the smallest 1 feet x 1 foot. Into them was pumped 2,160 cubic feet of grout. The deepest dive was 195 feet.
