July 21, at that time Dr. Irvin Roelck, Medical Director at CKCB, told the press.  
"In order to maintain a safe and adequate blood supply in central and eastern Kentucky, we at the Central Kentucky Blood Center, have found it necessary in devising a program of 'going to the people'.  
"Obtaining a totally self-contained mobile blood drawing station enables us to efficiently collect blood from volunteer and replacement donors, even in remote areas," Roelck continued. "This will be the first and only vehicle of its type in the Commonwealth."  
"In addition to making the donation convenient for the donor, it will help us to offset the skyrocketing cost of blood."  
When asked how CKCB would fund such a vehicle, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000, Roelck responded.  
"Careful study suggests that financial contributions from interested donors, even in remote areas," Roelck continued. "This will be the first and only vehicle of its type in the Commonwealth."  
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## USDA approves use of cheese alternate products in child nutrition programs

ATLANTA, Ga.—The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has amended regulations for the National School Lunch and Special Food Service Programs for Children to allow the use of "cheese alternate products" in these programs.  
These alternate products may be made from conventional ingredients such as milk and animal protein, and animal or vegetable fats. When served, they must be mixed with natural or processed cheese. The combined product may be used to meet all or part of the "minimum" alternate requirements of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and Special Food Service Program for Children. The amount of these alternate products served must not exceed that of the natural or processed cheese, and the cheese and cheese alternate product must be melted together in the cooking or heating process.  
Cheese alternate products are available in forms similar to mozzarella and American processed cheese. They are intended to be used as supplements to and not substitutes for meat, poultry, fish, or cheese. Meals containing cheese alternate products will be eligible for USDA cash reimbursement provided the product meets nutritional and physical specifications of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS).  
Specifications for these alternate products were published in proposed form on April 3 (USDA press release 29-74), and public comment was requested. Of the 86 responses received, 64 majority favored the new products.  
Use of these products by schools and serving institutions is on a voluntary basis.

## National Angus show, annual meet is Nov. 18-19 in Louisville

Entry deadline is Oct. 1 for the 1974 National Angus Show set for Nov. 18 and 19 in Louisville. The show will be held in conjunction with the all new North American Livestock Exposition and is expected to draw a record number of cattle and spectators to the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center, reports Lloyd D.P. Miller, executive secretary of the American Angus Association.  
The Association will also hold its annual meeting during the show, Miller reports. It will mark the first time in more than half a century that the annual meeting and convention of delegates has been held outside Chicago. It is expected to draw nearly 400 official delegates to the meeting set for 7:30 p.m. Monday, Nov. 18 in the Galt House Hotel on the riverfront in downtown Louisville. Only the 400 elected delegates may vote, but the meeting is open to the public. Miller said in a recent newspaper and mail set for that evening in the grand ballroom of the Galt House Hotel.

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
