Elderly farmer dies of burns

The body of an elderly Nicholas county farmer was found Tuesday night, Sept. 17 lying in a pile of brush around a tree he had been attempting to burn.

Nicholas County Coroner Billy Clark said George Martin Weddle, 74, of Pleasant Springs Road, died of severe burns.

Weddle's wife told Sheriff Reese "my husband had left the house around 1:30 p.m., and had gone to the field to burn out the tree stump, around which he had piled brush and old tires. When he failed to return home at his usual time, about 5:30, she asked neighbors to search for her husband.

The body was discovered by Adrian George, who lives in a nearby trailer.

Coroner Clark said Weddle apparently had stumbled backward. The charred body was found lying face up.

Easterly abandons sailing dream

Air Force Capt. Jim Easterly, Mrs. Easterly and Bob Colman, who set sail Aug. 4 from Taiwan, intending to make Ventura Harbor, near Los Angeles, within 60 days, are being forced one by one to abandon their dream.

They set sail from Taiwan on Easterly's 35 foot trimaran Eurus-Latin for the Goddess of the East Wing—with 80 days of supplies, three radios, two emergency transceivers and navigation equipment.

Upholsters Mary and Polly and tropical storm flow played havoc with their timetable once they got under way. They had planned to leave July 17 but there were some problems in getting the boat in shape and in getting a replacement. Easterly is on leave and must report to George AFB Sept. 30.

Mrs. Easterly, who spent most of the passage incapacitated by severe sea sickness, is recuperating in the Redona Dispensary. On Aug. 20, Colman flew home to the United States where he will attend college in Florida. And Easterly is running out of leave time.

"There's just not enough time left for me to finish the trip," he said.

Now, he's looking for someone to complete the Eurus for him. If he can't find anyone, he'll sail to Yokohama and load the Eurus on a freighter for the United States.

Eligible voters for ASCS committee

A list of the names of all persons to receive ballots in the upcoming annual ASCS commitment election is available in the county ASCS Office, reports Paul F. Hall, Executive Director.

This year's election will be by mail ballot between Nov. 18 and Dec. 3.

Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in these farmer committee elections, any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or sharecropper who is eligible to participate in any ASCS program.

Persons not of legal voting age who supervise and conduct farming operations on an estate farm are also eligible to vote in ASCS elections. No person can be denied the right to vote because of race, sex, color, religion, or national origin.

Several general provisions relate to ASC voter eligibility. A wife who operates a farm with her husband can vote if her name is on the deed of conveyance. A youth under 18 years of age can vote if he runs a farm, and a legal guardian who runs a farm for a child can vote for the child.

A person may cast a ballot in any county in which he is an eligible ASC voter, but he or she can vote in more than one community in the county. If an eligible voter has separate farm interests in more than one community in the same county, special care will be taken to see that only one ballot is issued to that voter.

Frost adds to farmers troubles

Monday's frost added to the troubles the Nicholas county tobacco farmer is already encountering because of the recent heavy rainfall. Many tobacco crops were frost killed Monday as temperatures dropped locally to 33 degrees, the coldest in history for that date.

Earl Noffsinger, Nicholas County Extension Agent, estimated Tuesday that only about 50% of the county's tobacco crop is in.

The recent heavy rainfall throughout Kentucky had already been damaging to this year's tobacco crop, agriculture specialists say, but farmers still have a fighting chance if sunny weather prevails over the next several weeks.

As of mid-September, burley cutting was running about 30 per cent behind schedule, said Arlin Scott of the Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Scott said that reports from county agents throughout the state indicate that approximately 41 per cent of the burley harvest was in, as compared to 66 per cent this time last year.

"The wet weather has damaged tobacco in both the field and the barn," Scott said. "There's been a high degree of rotting, more leaves are slipping off the stalks, and sucker growth is causing additional problems in some fields."

And, he added, materials for heating and drying are scarce in several parts of the state.

Harold Harberson, tobacco specialist in the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, said that although the total burley crop is going to be short, the final assessment will depend greatly upon the weather during the next few weeks.

An average of 1.5 to three inches of rain fell throughout Kentucky in the first two weeks of September, the National Weather Service reported, which is about one inch above normal. Scott said that Kentucky's other crops have not yet been damaged by the heavy rains, but that drier weather is needed to speed up maturation.

He joined the First Christian Church of Paris on Christmas of 1960, and in 1964 received the God and Country award of the Boy Scouts from that church. He graduated from Bellows High School in 1968 and from the University of Cincinnati in 1971 where he had played varsity football and track. In 1971, he moved his membership to the Walnut Hills Christian Church in Cincinnati. He completed one year of graduate school in mathematics at Cincinnati and worked as a studio artist in New York

before entering the Lexington Theological Seminary, where he has finished two years of work, majoring in Old Testament studies.

Before coming to the Carlisle First Christian Church in July of 1974, he had served as pastor of the Turner's Station Christian Church in Henry county and as a missionary to the Cincinnati campus area under the sponsorship of the Walnut Hills Church.

The choir of First Christian Church, under the direction of Mrs. Wendell Kingsolver will provide the special music for the occasion. Anyone who wishes to join with the choir may do so by contacting Mrs. Kingsolver and by attending rehearsal at 12:00 noon on Sunday, Sept. 29.

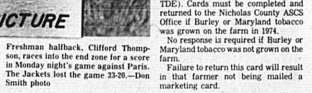

Farmers in Nicholas county have recently been mailed an M-28 Card (Report of Use or Non-Use of DDT or TDE). Cards which were not mailed are returned to the Nicholas County ASCS Office if Burley or Maryland tobacco was grown on the farm in 1974.

No response is required if Burley or Maryland tobacco was not grown on the farm.

Failure to return this card will result in that farmer not being mailed a marketing card.
