FRANKFORT—As the U.S. Senate continues its deliberations on the Republican bill to extend the term of office of federal judges, the issue of whether the bill should be passed is being debated.

The bill would extend the term of office of federal judges from eight to ten years. It is being opposed by Democrats and some Republicans.

Democrats and some Republicans are opposed to the bill because it would give judges a lifetime tenure. They argue that judges should be elected by the people.

Republicans, however, support the bill because they believe it will reduce the political influence over the judiciary. They argue that judges should not be subject to re-election.

The issue is still being debated in the Senate. It is expected that a final vote will be taken in the next few weeks.

The bill has the support of many members of both parties. It is one of the most controversial bills introduced in the Senate in recent years.
