Survivors include seven daughters,

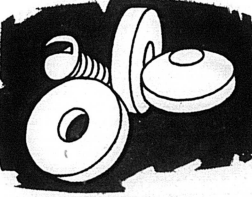

Hearing on tobacco marketing practices scheduled for April 25 in Frankfort

A public hearing on tobacco marketing practices has been scheduled Friday, April 25, at 10 a.m. (EDT) in the House Chamber of the State Capitol in Frankfort.
The hearing is part of a continuing investigation by a joint subcommittee of the legislature and the Department of Agriculture. The study was directed by Senate Joint Resolution 50 of the 1974 session.
Anyone wishing to speak at the hearing will have 10 minutes in which to do so. Written statements may be submitted in lieu of or in addition to oral testimony. Speaking order will be determined by random selection on the day of the hearing.
Invitations have been sent to farmers, auctioneers, warehousemen and tobacco company representatives.
In a preliminary report recently the subcommittee concluded that allocations had replaced the traditional auction system for selling burley tobacco.
Subcommittee chairman Representative Herman W. Battiff, R-Campbellsville, said, however, that no evidence of collusion on the part of buyers was detected during his 12 warehouses during the recent marketing season.
The subcommittee's findings paralleled those of the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation in a report published last fall.
Both studies found that during the past two marketing seasons buyers would not bid higher than each day's prevailing bid. As a result, warehousemen were forced to divide the land among buyers at the same price.

movement of moist air from the Gulf. When Danielson makes the prediction from NCAR headquarters in Boulder, the four aircraft participating in the experiment were moved into observation positions.
The specially instrumented aircraft will be measuring water vapor, the number of particles and condensation nuclei, super saturation of the air, ionic concentration, ozone and other atmospheric variables. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) will provide invariable assistance in piloting aircraft during the storm.
The storm—see storms, if more than one incident occurs between April 7 and May 7—is expected to cover the following area: Northern Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Western Tennessee and Kentucky, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois and Indiana. NCAR is requesting that people who observe unusually large hail from storms in that region during the experimental period assist by gathering hailstone samples for laboratory analysis.
