**GREEN TOMATO PICKLE**  
Take 4 quarts of green tomatoes, 4 small onions and 4 green peppers. Slice the tomatoes and onions thin. Sprinkle over them 1/2 cup coarse salt and leave overnight in a crock or enameled vessel. The next morning drain off the brine. Into a separate vessel put 1 quart vinegar, 1 level tablespoon each of black pepper, mustard seed, celery seed, cloves, allspice and cinnamon, and 1/2 cup sugar. Bring to a boil and then add the prepared tomatoes, onions, peppers. Let boil for 20 minutes. Put jars and seal while hot. For a better seal jars may be processed in hot water bath for 10 minutes.

**RETSUP (Smoothing Good)**  
1 quart apples  
1 quart tomatoes  
1 quart onions  
1 quart peppers (green and red)  
1 quart green tomatoes  
1 quart cabbage  
2 tablespoons coarse salt  
1 1/2 tablespoons prepared mustard  
Crisp all vegetables. Mix together. Add the rest of the ingredients. Stir well. Cook for 20 minutes. Can be sterilized jars. Measurements should be made as you go with each vegetable.

**SLICED GREEN TOMATO PICKLE**  
1 gallon green tomatoes (16 cups sliced)  
1/2 cup salt  
1/2 cup vinegar  
1/2 cup sugar (5% acidity)  
1 cup water  
4 cups sugar

### News coverage is old hat to 'Elly' Carroll

FRANKFORT—"She's getting to be more popular than her daddy," is the opinion of 'Elly' Carroll's daughter, Terry Howard.

Acting as a reporter with the troops of photographers and reporters visiting her, Elynn Kraton "Elly" Carroll nipped, yawned, and otherwise ignored the steady stream of strangers visiting her nursery. But her mother, Charlene, talked the baby talk and acted in the excited manner usually reserved for mothers who have just had their first child.

Elynn Carroll, the newest addition to Gov. Julian Carroll's family, has received press coverage in most of Kentucky's media, along with some nationwide press. But visiting photographers and reporters are old hat to her, and her mother explained, "What she really looks forward to is daddy coming home."

Gov. and Mrs. Carroll's busy schedule necessitates a day nurse at night. But from the hours of 4 p.m. to midnight, Elynn is in the hands of her parents.

"If she's asleep when Julian gets home from his meetings at night, he just wakes her up anyway to play with her," Mrs. Carroll explained. "They do a waltz routine that's really activity."

The governor's favorite activity with Elynn each night, Mrs. Carroll said, is to walk all over the mansion with her, Elynn, walk up and down the halls carrying her, and take her downstairs to see the (state police) troopers. "I don't let her see the troopers unless she and her little face just brightens right up when she sees her daddy."
