Since the price of potatoes is still too high for me I keep looking for recipes to replace that lost starch in our meals. Of course I've very seldom served bread and potatoes at the same time, but we are eating more bread. By that I mean homemade bread. I can't gratefully buy a loaf of bread and pay 27 to 67 cents for it. I get home and fuss and fuss. Guess I'll be the last to accept high food prices as just one of those things of our time.

Instead of potato salad try serving this Hot Summer Rice Salad. It may be served as a salad or as a main dish.

HOT SUMMER RICE SALAD
 1 cup long-grain rice
 8 slices bacon
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1 tablespoon water
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon celery seed
 1 tablespoon chopped onion
 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento
 1 hard-cooked egg, diced
 1 hard-cooked egg, sliced
 Cook rice according to package directions. Cook the rice a little under-done so it will still be fluffy when combined with other ingredients and cooked a few minutes longer. Cook bacon till crisp; drain and crumble. In saucepan, combine 1/2 cup of the bacon drippings, the cooked rice, and remaining ingredients except bacon. Cook and stir till liquid is absorbed; add most of the bacon—save a bit for topping; toss. Serve hot. Top with remaining crumbled bacon and hard-cooked egg slices. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

MUSHROOM RICE
 1 cup long-grain rice
 2 tablespoons chopped green onion
 1 tablespoon chopped green pepper
 4 tablespoons butter or margarine
 1 (14 ounce) can chicken broth or 2 thickened bouillon cubes dissolved in 2 cups of water
 1/8 teaspoon paprika
 dash cayenne
 1 (13 ounce) can sliced brined mushrooms, drained
 1/2 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
 In saucepan, cook rice, onion and green pepper for 1 minute. Add water to chicken broth to make 2 cups. Add rice according to package directions. Cook the rice a little
