Kentucky reflections

Do you suppose that we shall ever see an engineer who loves a tree? The Press has issued a public officials to protest the proposal to cut 101 trees along U.S. Highway 68, between Bowling Green and Russellville. Among the proposed victims are a grove of handsome water maples which are within the right of way on each side, should be extirpated. Any tree which interposes itself in the lane to which motorists has a superior right of way should be chopped down.

The hypoxic effect of the power saw enters here. Any observer of public outcry became too loud to be ignored the Bureau of Highways persisted in its plans. Wagner and Wilson, Inc., of Carlisle, was engaged to cut the trees, including that scenic arch of maples west of Bowling Green near Blue Level Road.
