### Fewer disaster applications filed

The nation's farmers are filing fewer disaster applications this year than they did last year, Paul E. Hall reported. Figures recently compiled by the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that disaster applications are down 25 percent from a year ago.

Generally favorable weather conditions throughout much of the country is the cause of the reduction, Hall said. To date, a total of 88,000 applications have been received, while at the same time last year, 115,000 applications had been made. Hall said one application had been received in Nicholas county so far this year, compared to six last year.
