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Earlie Flora dies of automobile injuries Monday

Earlie Flora, 81, of Carlisle died at 3:30 p.m. Monday, Sept. 1, 1975 at St. Joseph Hospital. Lacerations from injuries suffered in an automobile accident on Saturday.

Flora was returning to Carlisle from Millersburg on Saturday, Aug. 27 when he suffered a heart attack which caused him to lose control of his car about one mile this side of Millersburg on U.S. 58. State Trooper Steve Roy reported that Flora veered off the highway around 12:30 a.m. and crashed through a fence before finally coming to rest in a shallow creek 100 yards from the road. He received emergency treatment at Bourbon County Hospital for severe chest, neck and head injuries. He was then transferred to the intensive care unit at St. Joseph Hospital, where he remained in critical condition until his death on Monday.

Survivors include two sons, E.C. Flora of Lexington and Ellis Flora of New Vienna, Ohio; and two grandsons.

Services will be conducted Thursday, Sept. 4 at Mothers-Shears Chapel at 2 p.m. by Dr. J.T. Harmon. Burial in Carlisle Cemetery.

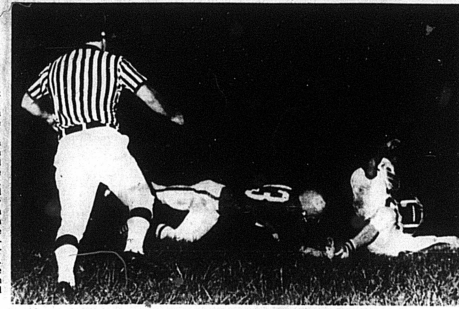
All tickets purchased for the rained-out game will be honored on Monday night.

Former teacher returns to Nicholas County

Mrs. Kathryn C. Timin, formerly Miss Kathryn Clay and wife of the late Louis M. Timin, assumed her duties as English teacher at Nicholas County High School on Aug. 25.

Mrs. Timin graduated from Carlisle High School, received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Georgetown College and her Master of Arts degree in English from Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn. She has earned her Rank I certification in Education. During the past three years, she has been working toward a Doctorate in Education in the English-Education Department at the University of Kentucky, where she has maintained a straight "A" standing.

She is a native of Nicholas county and a member of the Carlisle United Methodist Church. After 11 years of elementary school teaching in Nicholas county, she was engaged in missionary work in Japan under the auspices of the Woman's Division of Christian Service of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church. Her assignment as a missionary there was the teaching of English as a foreign language at Seiki Gakuen, a high school located in Yokohama, Japan.

Mrs. Timin taught seven years in Northern Kentucky as a high school teacher of English after her return to the States. Following that, she served as a college instructor in English at Palm
