History class tours county landmarks

The Nicholas County High School's U.S. History class visited various landmarks throughout Nicholas county Monday, Nov. 24. The trip was planned in order to help students learn more about the county, the people who helped make it and the places where important things occurred.

Places visited included Forest Hermit, home of Thomas Metcalfe, tenth governor of Kentucky. The farm is now owned by Dr. Edlie Asbury. While on this farm the class visited the Daniel Boone cabin which was built in 1795 and the Thomas Metcalfe Inn. It was once a United States Post Office. The Henry Thompson House built in 1785 was also toured.

Enroute to Blue Licks the class saw the Old Stone Tavern and the place where the old Nicholas County Court House used to stand.

The Old Blue Licks Resort was also visited. People used to come here for their health. The water was said to cure anything.

The students went to Heaven II farms where an old stone house was said to have chains in the cellar where slaves were kept.

The classes went to Black Hawk near Myers Station. There a house that was built by a Revolutionary soldier in 1783 was seen. The walls were in a very rare diamond shape. The chimney had a heart that was 4 1/2 feet wide. At one time it was the land around that area was a landmark.

The Joe Hunt farm was visited. There pioneers had left their names carved in a rock. Among them was Daniel Boone.

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
