## Carroll to seek 4-year governorship term

"I will seek the Democratic nomination for Governor in the coming May Primary.

"My official campaign committee will be named and my declaration papers will be filed with the Secretary of State in the next few days."

## Sen. Huddleston's new assignments

WASHINGTON—Senator Walter Dee Huddleston has been assigned to six subcommittees on the Senate Appropriations Committee—including subcommittees that oversee the budgets of several government departments and independent agencies.

Huddleston is now a member of 10 Senate subcommittees, six on Appropriations. His subcommittee assignments on Appropriations include those dealing with Departments of State, Commerce, and Justice; Housing and Urban Development Department and

independent agencies; public works; military construction; legislative (Congress); and the District of Columbia.

As a member of the committee, the senator did not receive any subcommittee chairmanships.

On the Agriculture Committee, Huddleston remains chairman of the subcommittee on Agricultural Programs. He is also a member of three other subcommittees: Agricultural Credit and Rural Electrification; Environment, Soil Conservation and Forestry; and Foreign Agricultural Policy.
