State agency sells seedlings

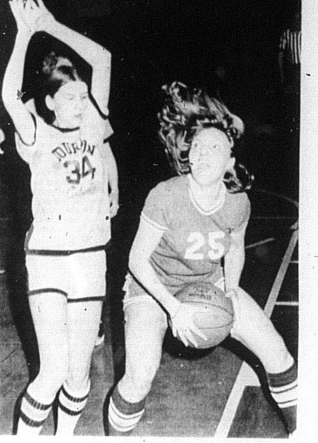
FRANKFORT—More trees are being grown in Kentucky and the nation than are being cut. But the state forestry agency warns that increased demand for lumber generated by population increases could surpass the amount of wood available if steps aren't taken now to bolster future supplies.

American Forestry Association officials estimate that nationally at least 40 million acres should be planted in trees during the next decade to meet future demands for wood and wood products. Latest state inventory figures indicate that nearly one million acres of side and grading land in Kentucky should be planted in trees.

To help Kentucky landowners reforest their idle acres, the division of forestry, in the Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, is selling out 11 million tree seedlings. The seedlings, which were grown at the three tree nurseries operated by the division, will be sold on a first come first serve basis this year, since several species are in short supply.

According to Harry Nadler, director of the division, the nurseries will start lifting and shipping seedlings to fill orders around Feb. 13 and will continue until about the first of April. He said that this year there will be a good supply of Black Locust, Loblolly Pine, White Pine, Scotch Pine, Virginia Pine, Kentucky on Quilting, closing with a prayer. Flu statistics still climbing

FRANKFORT—Flu statistics continue to climb in the Bluegrass with 1,874 new cases reported to the Department for Human Resources (DHR) for the week of Feb. 8.

Kentucky now has 14,885 new cases since the last reporting period with all regions showing a marked increase. Western Kentucky, the hardest hit region two weeks ago, rose to the top again this week with an additional 7,797 cases. South Central, the hardest hit last week, showed an increase of 789 new cases since the last reporting period. North Central has the lowest reported cases of all the regions, but showed a 406 case increase. Two affected Counties in the Bluegrass with a significant increase in the cases are Fayette up 528; Franklin, 201 and Madison, 100.

DHR's Bureau for Health Services received reports from local health departments in 51 counties. These reports are based only on reports submitted by physicians. A case must have been severe enough to warrant contacting a physician and the physician must file a report before it is included.
