## Rep. Arnold named to subcommittee

Representative Adrian Arnold, Democrat, Mt. Sterling, has been named to a special legislative subcommittee to study new methods of taxing Kentucky's farm lands.

A bill which would have based property taxes on the potential productivity of the farm land instead of its market value, as is now done, passed the 1974 legislature, but was vetoed by Governor Ford, who said it would cause too many administrative problems.

"Most farmers favor this legislation," said Representative Arnold. "They want a proposal that would insure a fair tax rate. If administered correctly, a uniform lowering of farm property tax assessments might be possible." He and Senator Berry, the other member of the subcommittee, will work with the State Department of Revenue to see if a workable proposal can be introduced in the 1976 General Assembly.

## Fire threatens

Nitrogen fertilizer is essential in the production of crops," said Representative Arnold, "and as the farmers approach the 1973 planting season, the country is in the midst of a critical fertilizer shortage."

The problem surfaced when the FPC agreed to cut back the supply of natural gas to a manufacturer of nitrogen fertilizer, resulting in a 10 per cent reduction in the supply of nitrogen fertilizer for Kentucky's farmers.

The resolution asks Congress and the FPC to take action to guarantee the availability of natural gas for the production of nitrogen fertilizer.

"If the FPC does not reverse its ruling," said Representative Arnold, "the agricultural community and the state welfare will be severely damaged."

In other action, the Agriculture subcommittee voted to send a resolution protesting the Federal Power Commission's ruling reducing the production of nitrogen fertilizer to Kentucky's Congressional Delegation in Washington.

In the meantime, the State police are guarding the articles.

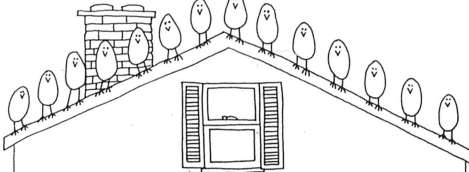
