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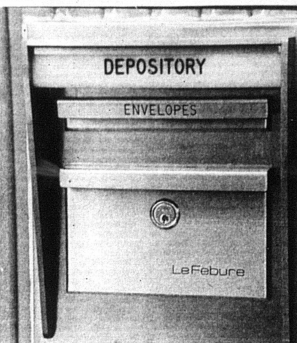
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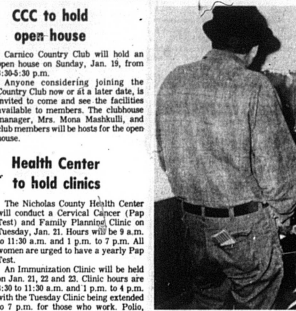
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**CCC to hold open house**

## Hunter re-elected chairman County Board of Education

William Hunter was re-elected chairman of the Nicholas County Board of Education at the January meeting last Wednesday. Roy Linnville, the newly-elected member from the Moorefield district, was sworn in by Mrs. Gayle Bowen.  
Linnville succeeds R.S. Willis, who chose not to run for re-election last year.  
Bobby Anderson, Nicholas County Property Valuation Administrator, spoke to the board about the tax rate for the coming year. Anderson said that some property in the county would have to be re-assessed to come into line with a 100% assessment guideline from the state.  
No action was taken but the board and Anderson discussed the matter at length.  
The board approved the use of the high school gym by the National Guard Jan. 9 and 10 for a basketball tournament. Proceeds will be used to send children to camp this summer.  
The board also approved the use of the gym by MMJ Jan. 28. MMJ's gym was damaged recently in a fire and the school requested a date at Nicholas County for a home game. The game will be part of a double-header with the first game matching Nicholas and Paris, a regularly-scheduled game.  
In other business the board authorized Ronnie McDonald to make necessary repairs to the heating system at the high school, approved Group 1 (social studies) textbooks for the 1974-80 school years and changed the February meeting date from Feb. 1 to Feb. 8.

## Nicholas native now Ashland city engineer

Ole S. Green, a 56-year-old retired Chesite System civil engineer, has been named Ashland's new city engineer, replacing M.R. Stewart who retired last Tuesday.  
Mr. Green is formerly of Nicholas county and is married to the former Lou Booth of Nicholas county.  
City Manager F. Vaughn Strider made the announcement, calling Green a "well-qualified individual." Green, of 1601 Maryland Parkway, took office Wednesday, Strider said.  
Green, a resident of Ashland for the last 14 years, has most recently been in private practice as an engineer. He was project engineer during construction of the expanded areas of the Ashland-Boyers County Airport.  
Green worked with the Chesite System for 30 years, retiring in 1971. His duties included operations supervision, labor relations and liaison work between the railroad and governmental agencies.  
Green is vice chairman of the Salvation Army advisory board here, a member of the district committee of the Boy Scouts of America and an advisory board member of the Ashland Area YMCA. He is also a Sunday school teacher and a board member at the Christ United Methodist Church in Ashland.  
Green replaces 65-year-old Stewart, Ashland's engineer since 1968. Existing city ordinances state certain city employees, including the city engineer, must retire during the year of their 60th birthday.  
Strider said Stewart would continue to assist the city in a "consultative capacity" as an advisor and an aide to Green during the transition period.  
The Ashland Board of City Commissioners has not taken any official action in hiring Stewart or in appointing or consulting with Green.  
Green is a registered engineer and land surveyor.

## Joe Blount named Federal Reserve Bank director

Willis J. Winn, president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland, has announced the appointment of Joe D. Blount of Cynthia, as a Director on the Board of Directors of the Cincinnati Branch, Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland. Mr. Blount is president of the National Bank of Cynthia. His appointment is for a three-year term commencing Jan. 1, 1975.  
Mr. Blount attended the University of Kentucky and The School of Banking at Louisiana State University and has received various certificates from the American Institute of Banking.

An Immunization Clinic will be held on Jan. 21, 22 and 23. Clinic hours are 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. with the Tuesday Clinic being extended to 3 p.m. for those who work. Polio, DPT and Measles-Rubella vaccine will be available.

- Motions passed at the regular meeting of City Council Monday night are:
- Building permits to Clay Hunt to tear down old building at corner of East Main and East Union Road; and Dr. Kingolver to tap water line behind Leon Roundtree's house on industrial drain to keep water out of basement.
  - An annual city ordinance on auto stickers to extend deadline for purchasing same until Feb. 1 each year.
  - To publish mobile homes ordinance and new gas rate ordinance in paper to inform public. Old gas rates are being used for bills, but rates listed are not current rates.
  - Fine for parking in "No Parking" zone to be raised to \$1.50.
  - Employees officially hired and new salaries are: Gayle Vanlandingham as City Gas Superintendent at \$800 per month; Oliver Vize as Water System Superintendent at \$600; Norman (Doug) Willis to read meters and work at Water Plant, effective Feb. 1; Leonard Trivette as policeman effective to Dec. 31; Henry Caswell on city crew Jan. 15; and Bob Barnett as Fire Chief for 1975. All passed unanimously, 5-4 with Julian Green absent because he is on vacation.
  - Clarence Moss hired to operate radio 40 hours per week. City pay \$2.00 per hour for 30 hours; county to pay for other 20 hours. Vote was 4-1, with Clarence Green voting against the motion. Moss will not be of policeman rank.
  - Water haulers to be billed monthly and this other.
  - City Attorney said to write a letter to Greyhound's attorney protesting decision to discontinue bus service to Carlisle.

## Preparedness conference at courthouse tonight

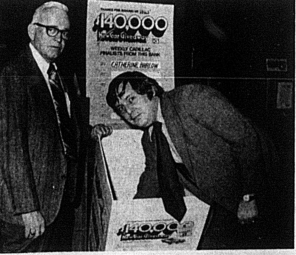
An Emergency Preparedness Conference is scheduled Thursday, Jan. 16, starting with registration at 7 p.m. It will be held at the Nicholas County Courthouse and community leaders and individual citizens are urged to attend.  
No fee is charged for the conference.  
Wayne Henry, special education coordinator of the Disaster and Emergency Services, will preside. Dr. S. Evans Brown will give the invocation, followed by welcome addresses by Judge Floyd Clark and Mayor William Power.  
William T. Dodson, acting deputy director of DMEES, will discuss "Disaster Responsibility." Henry Vick, special education assistant coordinator of DMEES, will speak on "Emergency Planning." Horn Padgett, training and education officer of DMEES, will discuss "Emergency Preparedness Training." Bob Bantlin, DMEES Area III Coordinator, and Rubel Williams, Nicholas County Director, will discuss "Local Emergency Capability."  
All city and county officials, as well as interested citizens, are invited to attend. Judge Clark has stated that: "This is one of a series of conferences designed to reappraise local emergency preparedness capabilities and to emphasize the continuing need for local efforts."

## ASCS is accepting farm allotment applications

New farm applications are now being accepted at the Nicholas County ASCS Office. In order to be eligible for a new farm allotment, the following requirements must be met:  
1. Neither the owner or operator shall own or operate another farm in the United States with a current year allotment. Base, or quota for the commodity for which the application is filed.  
2. The producer must own, or have readily available, equipment and other facilities necessary for the production of the commodity.  
3. The operator must expect to obtain more than 50 percent of his current year income from farming.  
4. Must have experience during at least two of the previous five years on a farm having an effective allotment or quota for the commodity.  
Deadline for filing applications is Feb. 15, 1975.
