## Dairymen's Conference set Jan. 30-31

Dairy farmers from throughout the state of Kentucky will meet in Louisville Jan. 30 and 31 for the fourth annual Kentucky Dairymen's Conference. The conference, sponsored by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, will be held at the Holiday Inn conference room in Louisville.

The conference will get underway at 10:30 a.m. on Thursday, Jan. 30. The first speaker will be Earl Wilson, Professor of Animal Sciences at UK, who will discuss the impact of the new high-protein grain. He will be followed by Lewis Newman, Michigan State University veterinarian, who will talk about infectious diseases of dairy cattle.

The luncheon speaker will be Clarence "Buckhead" Underwood, UK assistant football coach, who will talk about UK's football program. The first speaker in the afternoon will be H.W. Everett, Associate Professor of Animal Science at Cornell University. Helping dairymen understand the new sire summaries will be his topic. Farm credits will be discussed by Earl Wilson, president of the Mammoth Cave Cattle Association at Lexington, and Glasgow, John H. Nicolai Jr., Extension dairy specialist at UK, will describe dry cow, clinical, and medicinal treatment of mastitis.

## 150 state jobs open

A plan to hire the jobs under the recently enacted Emergency Jobs and Unemployment Assistance Act, announced by Gov. Julian Carroll, will serve to fight unemployment and inflation while at the same time improve services to the citizens of Kentucky.

Plans call for the addition of 150 unemployed individuals to fill state government positions resulting from increased demand for services. Fifty qualified individuals will be hired as care home inspectors and 100 will serve as food stamp eligibility workers.

The Division of Licensing and Regulation needs additional staff to carry out statewide inspection of care homes, especially "nursing homes." Use of this type of facility has grown rapidly in recent months, partially as a result of an increase in the percentage of aged population. And, too, laws regarding inspection of nursing homes did not come into effect until just over a year ago, adding this type of facility to other personal care facilities.

The addition of 50 inspectors will facilitate this service in the Commonwealth.

"By utilizing federal funds, needs will be served without additional expenditure of state monies which are already being covered by inflation," Gov. Carroll said.

To qualify for these jobs, an individual must meet both federal and state personnel standards.

Federal standards for employment require that the applicant be unemployed for 30 days or more and reside in an eligible county. Priority for selection will be given to those who have exhausted their unemployment insurance, those who have been judged ineligible for unemployment insurance or those who have been unemployed for at least 15 weeks.

State personnel rules require the applicant to have a college degree or its equivalent in training and experience. Once employed, the worker will be governed by rules of the State Merit System.

Those interested in applying for these jobs should contact the State Personnel Department, Room 280, Capitanone, Frankfort, Ky., 40601, for an application and testing. All positions will be filled from state employment registers.

## Federal excise tax reduced on phone bills

Telephone customers in Carlisle and Nicholas county will pay less federal excise tax on their telephone service beginning Jan. 1, according to C.A. Harris, South Central Bell's local manager.

On bills rendered on or after that date, the federal excise tax on local and long distance charges will be reduced one per cent, from eight to seven. The reduction results from an act passed by Congress in 1973, which calls for the gradual reduction of the federal excise tax on telephone service. It will continue to be reduced one per cent a year until it is completely eliminated in 1982.

## Fire strikes MMI library

Fire strikes library at M.M.I. Monday morning, the second fire within two months.

Firemen reported the blaze apparently broke out in a women's restroom adjacent to the library. The fire was discovered about 8:40 a.m. by a student on his way to class.

where those which were used as public places, used for religious worship, places of burial, institutions of purely public charity, institutions of non-profit education, public libraries and single-unit residences occupied by persons 65 years of age or older. It stipulated single-unit tax exemption up to the assessed valuation of \$6,500 on each residence.

Owners of a duplex may apply if the duplex is owned jointly by two persons and each is 65 years or older or if either owner has a spouse 65 years or older. Each eligible owner must live in a separate unit of the duplex. The exemption may apply to both of them as if they owned a single homestead.

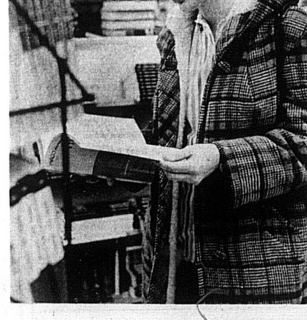
