## Huddleston criticizes Ford proposals

WASHINGTON—Senator Walter Dee Huddleston has criticized two recent proposals by the Ford administration—one that would limit cost-of-living increases in Social Security to 3 percent, and another that would raise the cost of food stamps.

The senator, noting that in Kentucky 130,000 families utilize the program, said he would oppose efforts to increase the cost of food stamps. "When properly operated, the food stamp program is a good program," Huddleston added. "There are abuses and they need to be eliminated, but the food stamp program is not the proper place to cut the budget—especially right now. To increase the cost of the stamps would be literally taking food off the table of millions of families—which include elderly persons and small children."

The Kentucky senator said such a move would constitute a "double whammy" because the increased costs of food have already lessened the amount of food that the stamps purchase.

"In both cases, limiting Social Security cost-of-living adjustments and increasing the cost of food stamps, the administration is asking those least able to afford it to make the sacrifice."

## KACO office formally opened

County officials from across the state of Kentucky gathered in Frankfort Jan. 22 to formally open the newly formed Kentucky Association of Counties (KACO) office.

Gov. Julian Carroll, who presided, attended the function and wished KACO success in assisting county government with its objectives and offering his assistance in helping counties meet the challenges of the coming years.

Franklin County Judge Jack Goina welcomed his fellow county officials to the state's capital county and pledged his support to assist the new state association in its endeavors.

KACO President, Fayette County Judge Robert Stephens presided over the event which was attended by approximately 300 state and county officials. Judge Stephens outlined the history, functions, and priorities of the new association.

Included in the priorities of the new association's program are revision of the juvenile code, an improved county fee system, study of county collective bargaining controls and passage of continued general revenue sharing.

KACO Vice-President, Carter County Circuit Court Clerk Gene Cline introduced the KACO Board of Directors which included 13 members elected from the Area Development Districts and the nine presidents of the county officials organizations.

Currently, 90 counties have joined the new association including Kentucky's largest and smallest counties. Once a county joins by action of the fiscal court, all county officials in that county are members of the association.

Nicholas county is a member of KACO.
