Accidents plague local motorists; nobody injured

Three collisions occurred locally three days in a row last week, and a minor accident occurred Tuesday early. None of the people involved were hurt.

Jan. 29—Donny G. Cox, Route 4, Carlisle, traveling south on Locust Street, collided with a car driven by Billy Reese Allison of Sycamore Hill. Allison was traveling west on North Street. Cox was cited for running and disregarding a stop sign at the corner of

Locust and North, according to City Police Chief Allen Earlywine. On Jan. 30, Bobby G. Fredrick of Route 3, Carlisle, who was parked on Locust Street in the Courthouse block, backed out into the path of a car driven by Bowman Isaacs of Nicholasville. Isaacs' car, traveling south on Locust, sustained damage to the right back fender. City police answered the call Feb. 1.—Mrs. Joe P. Blount, Mockingbird Lane, pulled out into the

path of Bobby Crockett of Carlisle who was traveling toward town on Highway 28, according to Sheriff Reese Snoot. The accident occurred at Route 28 and Highway 28. Sheriff Snoot said both cars sustained considerable damage. Feb. 4—Miss Martha Sides, Route 3, Carlisle, lost control of her car about 2 a.m., according to Sheriff Snoot, and the car went through Ota Casswell's fence on the Old Paris Pike.

Conservation Essay contest winners

Tuesday, Jan. 28, the awards for winners in the annual Conservation Essay Contest were presented at the Nicholas County Elementary School and the Nicholas County High School.

This contest is sponsored by the Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times in cooperation with the Kentucky Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts and the Nicholas County Conservation District. A \$25 U.S. Savings Bond is awarded by the Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times to the first place winner and all other prizes are given by the local District.

The title of this year's contest was "Water—It's Effect on My Community." A total of 274 essays were written in the schools this year. This was an increase due to greater support of the contest in the high school. County prizes were: 1st place, Ricky Alan Bailey; 2nd place, Ed. Ann Kingsolver; 3rd place, Mark Vice; 4th place, Ed. Gregory Haney; 5th place, Ed. Steve Vice; 6th place, Ed. Durrell Section.

Burley tobacco quota for 1975 announced

Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butts has announced a national marketing quota of 670 million pounds for the 1975 crop of burley tobacco. The 1975 crop quota is 10 percent larger than the 1974 quota of 608 million pounds.

Notices of individual farm poundage quotas for 1975 will be mailed to farm operators by local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committees as soon as adjustments can be made to reflect undermarketings and overmarketings of 1974 farm quotas. As in the past, a small amount of quota will be reserved in 1975 to establish quotas for farms having no burley history during the last five years, for

correcting errors, and for adjusting inequities. Department officials pointed out that the increase was necessary to provide an adequate supply to meet market demands. Domestic use and exports of burley tobacco during the three years the poundage quota program has been in effect have exceeded marketings by 75 million pounds. Further increases in domestic use and exports are expected in the years ahead.

Legislation provides that the poundage quota established for any farm for any year shall be increased by the number of pounds by which marketings from the farm during the preceding year were less than the farm's

poundage quota. Likewise, any marketings in excess of a farm's quota are deducted from the farm's quota for the following year. If producer marketings turn out to be 54 million pounds, as currently estimated, undermarketings of 1974 farm quota will increase farm quotas in effect for 1975 by about 121 million pounds. Thus, farm quotas in effect for 1975 are expected to total about 791 million pounds about 12 percent more than the quotas in effect last year.

Burley tobacco is grown principally in Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana and Missouri.

The Harrison County Area Vocational Education located in Cynthiana, serves the high school students from Nicholas, Harrison, Bourbon, and Prentiss counties. The courses offer training (such as: 1) Auto Mechanics; 2) Business and office; 3) Carpentry; 4) Drafting; 5) Health; 6) Machine Shop and 7) Welding. Students in these courses not only receive credit toward high school graduation, but at the same time may achieve an academic level and develop skills that will enable them to at least obtain gainful employment on an entry level. If they choose to further their training they may go on to a Vocational Technical school to complete their desires.
