Funeral services were held on Wednesday, June 11, at 1:30 p.m., at Price Brothers Funeral Home. Burial in the Elizaville Cemetery.

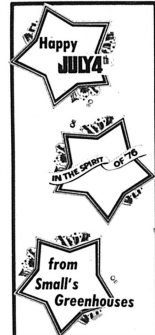
**MRS. LEM PIERCE**
