Ford to head subcommittee

WASHINGTON—Sen. Wendell H. Ford (D-Ky.) will head the first subcommittee to be established by the Aeronautical and Space Sciences Committee.

He has been named chairman of the Subcommittee on Aerospace Technology and National Needs. The appointment was announced by Senators Frank Moss, chairman, and Barry Goldwater, ranking minority member.

Ford's new assignment covers a number of areas and responsibilities.

Under the Basic Educational Opportunity Grants (Basic Grants) program sponsored by HEW's Office of Education, eligible students may be awarded anywhere from \$200 to \$1,000 a year to help meet their educational expenses. The U.S. Government does not require repayment of such awards.

Students who have begun their post high school education after April 1, 1973, and attend at least half-time can qualify. They may attend any one of the over 5,000 eligible schools. These include not only traditional colleges and universities, but also vocational, technical, business schools, and hospital schools of nursing.

To apply for a Basic Grant a student must first complete and submit an "Application for Determination of Basic Grant Eligibility" for the 1975-76

Senate approves money for summer employment

A resolution, co-sponsored by Sen. Wendell Ford, to release \$53,000 for summer jobs in Kentucky, has received unanimous approval by the Senate. The measure disapproves the President's impoundment of Youth Conservation Corps funds.

According to Ford, the funds had earlier been approved by the Senate, first as part of the Emergency Appropriations bill and then again as part of the Continuing Resolution. The President signing the Resolution June 27, but later indicated he planned to defer indefinitely the release of these funds for summer forest and resource conservation jobs in the states.

"I took this move because only if the funds were freed immediately could the Youth Conservation Corps use the

money this summer," Ford said. "The President's deferral was in complete disregard of the will of Congress, and this Resolution reaffirmed our intent that these funds be used this summer."

Ford called the Youth Conservation Corps "one of the Federal Government's most effective and successful programs."

"It enables many deserving young people to have a summer job that makes a significant contribution to the betterment of our communities," Ford said.

Ford added that if the President and the Office for Management and Budget move to completely rescind the funds, the Senate will follow with whatever action necessary to disapprove it.

American Issues Forum to begin in September

The American people have been invited to participate in a serious exploration and discussion of some of the issues that are fundamental to our American society through the American Issues Forum.

The Forum, a major Bicentennial project designed by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) and co-sponsored by the American Revision Bicentennial Administration, is basically a calendar of topics for discussion beginning in September, 1975 and extending through May, 1976. The topics, one per month, are divided into four subtopics areas, each subtopic corresponding to a particular week.

Each of the nine monthly topics is an issue that the NEH says, has "affected the American life from the beginning, that affects it today, and that will surely affect it for generations to come."

Civic groups, churches, schools, clubs, colleges, foundations, corporations, unions, the media and organizations of all sorts are encouraged to participate in the Forum by incorporating its calendar of topics into their normal program or by developing special projects to promote the forum. A reading, viewing and listening list for the American Issues Forum has been prepared by the American Library Association and is available free from libraries and other organizations.

The NEH says, "The calendar of the American Issues Forum will help us to give each aspect of our national life the periodic attention it deserves. An effort

at public discourse seems an especially fitting way to commemorate the celebration of our Bicentennial. The Declaration of Independence was itself the product of well-ordered debate."

The calendar contains topics with the various aspects of immigration and national unity, with working in America, business, America's place in the world and foreign policy, the American family, the question of maintaining constitutional rights, the nature of the American government, and the use of the American land.

Finally, the NEH says, "America is as much characterized by its rich variety of organizations and pervasive media as it is by its outspoken independent citizenry. The American Issues Forum provides a chance for all of them to direct their energies and imaginations towards a unique celebration of the Bicentennial year. These are qualities which America has always prized. They are especially valuable now."

Ky. senators chosen by Mansfield

Kentucky's two U.S. Senators have been named by an advisory committee which will help establish, then work with an independent commission on the improvement of Senate operations and procedures.

Senators Walter "Dee" Huddleston and Wendell Ford were the only members from a single state picked for the special assignment by Majority Leader Mike Mansfield.

They join Senators John Culver, Iowa; Lee Metcalf, Montana; Robert Byrd, West Virginia; Floyd Haskell, Colorado; Herman Talmadge, Georgia; and Philip Hart, Michigan.

The committee will advise a commission of private citizens, expected to be established by resolution in the near future. If approved, the commission membership will be selected by both the Democratic and

Republican leadership.

In letters to Huddleston and Ford, Mansfield indicated he would meet with Minority Leader Hugh Scott on what he termed, a "blue ribbon commission" formation.

The advisory committee would assist in the Senate's formal establishment of the commission, and continue offering input on matters pertaining to law-making, presentation and oversight.

During the commission's tenure, expected to operate through the 94th Congress, areas of examination would probably center on such topics as committee and floor procedure, information resources, workload, work space, equipment requirements, conflict of interest, and internal management.

Both Ford and Huddleston have been

advocates of improved Senate operations, a subject growing in interest especially among those members representing the last three classes.

In a joint statement, the Kentucky Senators said they applauded the move, especially the ideas advanced by Culver and the interest shown by Mansfield.

"There is a chance finally, for us to correct several long-standing problems, restructure the Senate's internal policies, and moderate our scope of operations. We feel very strong about grasping the opportunity now in order to overcome many of the obstacles hampering our ability to properly serve in the Legislative branch," the Kentucky Senators said.
