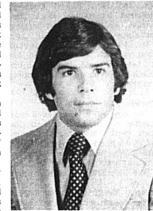
Blue Grass names Wyss manager of Special Products Division

Two Lexington teenagers have been sentenced to custody of the U.S. Attorney General until their 21st birthdays for their part in the Farmers Exchange Bank, Millersburg, robbery on June 18. U.S. District Judge Bernard T. Moynihan imposed the sentences upon the 16 and 17 year old boys after they pleaded guilty to juvenile delinquency. Gary Wayne Webb, 16, Lexington is being held under \$25,000 bond for an Aug. 5 appearance in U.S. District Court, Lexington, on a bank robbery charge. If convicted, he could be sentenced to up to 25 years in prison.

Nicholas-Robertson Conservation fish fry July 31

The Nicholas and Robertson County Conservation Districts will hold their 12th joint cooperators' annual meeting and fish fry at Blue Licks State Park, Thursday, July 31, at 7 p.m.

Both Robertson and Nicholas County Boards will present Honor and Master Conservationist Awards. A Master Conservationist Award is presented by the Kentucky Soil and Water

Conservation Commission to those persons who have completed more than 60% of the planned conservation practices on their farms. A basic conservation plan is prepared through the local conservation district and the landowner or manager works towards achieving and completing the plan. The conservation district board of supervisors watches the progress and when they think the plan is 90% complete, they secure a score sheet from the Soil and Water Conservation Commission to make a final determination. The score sheet must be certified by a member of the board of supervisors and at least three agencies that work in natural resource development within the District. These are highly coveted awards and those who receive them certainly deserve the recognition.
