Lexington attorney W. Terry McBrayer, former executive assistant to Gov. Julian Carroll, will be the featured speaker at Thursday, July 31, at Morehead State University's summer commencement.

MSU President Adron Doran will award degrees to nearly 500 persons during the 1 1/2 a.m. ceremony at Webber Gymnasium.

Honorary doctoral degrees will be conferred on McBrayer, State Finance Commissioner William E. Scott, State Sen. Nelson R. Allen of Russell and State Rep. Larry J. Hopkins of Lexington.

McBrayer, an MSU graduate and former state representative, is a past president of the MSU Alumni Association. The Greeting Alumni recently was named chairman of the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

He holds a law degree from the University of Louisville.

He also serves as secretary of the governor's executive cabinet, is a law graduate of the University of Kentucky and a former state representative and U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Kentucky.

Sen. Allen, a two-time graduate of MSU, was elected to the State Senate in 1971. An elementary school principal, he is a past president and executive secretary of the Eastern Kentucky Education Association.

Rep. Hopkins, a native of Graves county, was elected to the Kentucky House in 1971. The former Fayette county court clerk was selected in 1974 by the Bluegrass Mental Retardation Association as "legislator of the year."

An investment counselor, he is a graduate of Wingo High School and Murray State University.
