There is no need for me to try to tell you the cost of food is down. Anyone who cooks knows it isn't, no matter what "they" say. And where are all those fresh garden vegetables one should be able to buy at a reasonable price here in mid-summer? The only fresh garden vegetable we have had is zucchini, thanks to our friends.

Anyway back to the old budget. If you combine foods you can certainly come up with a dish that could serve almost twice as many. For instance the Beans and Chicken recipe extends one frying chicken into 10 servings. This recipe came to me originally using blackeye peas. Now you like blackeye you go ahead and use them, but for me I changed to white beans—so you take your choice.

BEANS AND CHICKEN
 1 (2 1/2) lb. ground frying chicken
 4 cups salt, pepper
 2 tablespoons salad oil
 1 tablespoon butter
 1/2 cup chopped onion
 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced,
 or one 4 oz. can or jar. Save liquid in
 case you need it later.

responsible for delivery of a major part of the services delivered to the people. When all of these agencies were thrown together in one Department it was a government of the people by the people.

Secretary Les Dawson came in in Gov. Carroll and has been trying to unravel the tangle.

When Carroll said, "In some cases, we have no program manager; no one individual directly responsible for program success or failure," he was pointing to Human Resources, knowledgeable people around here believe.

The Department is just too huge for one man to ride herd on, and Dawson has been busy trying to delegate authority, a thing that is lacking even to be looked over the job.

Carroll's people have been investigating and studying the situation. There is a possibility that this huge conglomerate may be broken down again into some separate agencies. At least some changes are going to be made so services can be delivered efficiently to the people.

Grissom named to Council on Public Higher Education

FRANKFORT—Gov. Julian Carroll has appointed J. David Grissom of Louisville to the Council on Public Higher Education and Reappraisal.

Edward F. Prichard of Frankfort is that same body.

Carroll said that Prichard has made great contributions to the council in the past. He commended Prichard for his work in assembling more control over the advancement of higher education in the Commonwealth.

Carroll said the 38-year-old Grissom has shown the ability to grasp and make the best of difficult situations. The governor stressed that being a council member is a difficult job because members must take our available resources and utilize them in the best interest of the people of the state.

Grissom said that the initial stages of his term will be spent learning as much about the council as possible—its authority and responsibilities.
