If you are a zucchini fan you are in luck because this delicious item green vegetable is so versatile. No matter what the size, a small tender one or one that has missed the gardeners eyes for a few days and suddenly looks "old-stick" can be prepared into a delightful dish.

You can serve zucchini from sticks for dips to a main dish.

For dip sticks use small crisp tender raw zucchini. Just wash and trim off stem and cut into sticks.

DILL DIP FOR ZUCCHINI
2 (16 oz.) packages cream cheese softened
2 tablespoons finely chopped stuffed green olives
1/4 teaspoon grated onion
1/4 teaspoon salt
dash of saffron
Dash of Worcestershire sauce

Roll zucchini, cut into sticks
Combine first five ingredients, stir in enough milk to make mixture dipping consistency. Chill. This will make almost a cup of dip. Taste for seasoning, you may like a bit more onion or less olive so be sure to suit your taste.

FRANKFORT—A special legislative committee on collective bargaining decided last week to strike Gov. Julian Carroll out publicly about his stand on collective bargaining.

The special committee was appointed by Carroll when he was still lieutenant governor and head of the Legislative Research Commission to draft a report for LIC and possibly to draft a bill for introduction in the 1976 General Assembly.

Carroll and his press secretary John Nichols got into a hassle with a Bowling Green reporter over a story written that included the subject. The hassle developed over the words "probably" and "possibly." The reporter had asked Carroll if he would sign a collective bargaining bill for public employes if the Legislature passed one and sent it to

him. The reporter quoted Carroll saying "probably" and Carroll claims he said "possibly."

Anyway, at a meeting of the committee last week State Senator Walter Baker, R-Glasgow, made a motion to ask Carroll and several key members of his administration to appear at the committee's next scheduled meeting, Aug. 25. Carroll has failed to appear so far.

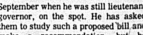
The committee wants to state his position at both the June and July meetings of the committee.

Gable releases white paper on agriculture

Gubernatorial candidate Robert E. "Bob" Gable called for tax reductions, a stronger voice for farmers, more agricultural research and information and re-evaluation of binding regulations when he was still lieutenant governor, on the spot. He has asked them to study such a proposed bill and make a recommendation, but he refuses to take a position on it himself.

Senator Baker, obviously for political reasons, is trying to nail Carroll and his administration down to a position on collective bargaining with binding arbitration for public employes.

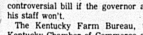
Gable has charged that Carroll wants to unite public employes which Gable claims will be disastrous for the state's 30,000 classroom teachers.

The special committee voted to send invitations for its next meeting to Carroll, Human Resources Secretary Leslie Dawson, Transportation Secretary John C. Rogers, Personnel Commissioner Cattie Lou Miller and Philip Tallero, chairman of the State Personnel Board.

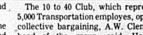
But he added, "Over-regulation of agriculture, rising prices of raw materials, inflation in the economy, the 10 to 16 club, which represents 5,000 Transportation employes, opposes collective bargaining. Not all classroom teachers support the idea and neither do several groups of state employees. The Kentucky Association of Highway Engineers are neutral on the issue. President James M. Carrigan Jr. told newsmen, "Most of the engineers of this organization work for the Highway Department."

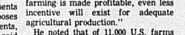
"Unless this trend is arrested and farming is made profitable, even less incentive will exist for adequate agricultural production."
