## Worm-like larvae attacking foliage

Armies of tiny worm-like larvae are attacking the lush green oak and chestnut foliage in eastern Kentucky, leaving gaping brown splitches in the foliage. The Oak Skeletonizer, a moth, has returned to large sections of the Daniel Boone National Forest for its biannual feast. This year's outbreak is noticeable on the hills lining Interstate 75 between London and Berea, but has been observed in areas throughout the 640,000-acre forest. The tiny moth could produce two generations per year, the first developing in April and May. It is particularly apparent during July and August when denuded leaves contrast with the green background. Although this is the second year for an outbreak, national forest timber managers are not too worried because of nature's own defenses. While the hungry moth attacks during its second, or larval stage, the quarter-inch insect is too late and too selective to do major damage. The larvae seem to prefer dining on red oak, although it will attack some pin and white oak. Chestnut is not affected. Even though this year's attack is a few weeks early, the growing period is almost over and trees are storing energy for the coming fall and winter. The ravenous larva strips the green chlorophyll on the leaves, with only the browned skeleton remaining. Thus it gets the common name of Oak Skeletonizer. The larvae usually attack only a portion of the foliage, allowing the unharmed leaves to support the tree. Occasionally herds of them will strip an entire tree. Resource managers are confident the timber could survive several attacks without loss of production because in most cases only a small portion of the tree is damaged. They plan to survey the attacks damage after the larvae become adult moths at the end of August.

## June 78 percent hotter than year ago

June was a scorcher, running 78 percent hotter than June, 1974, and Kentucky Utilities Company customers used their fans and air conditioning more to keep them comfortable. It all adds up to hot weather, greater use of electricity and higher electric bills. The hot weather story for the month is recorded in figures supplied by the National Weather Service at Blue Grass Field in Lexington. They show 267 cooling degree days for this June compared with 166 for June a year ago. (To find a day's degree days, 65 is subtracted from the midpoint between the high and low temperatures for the day. Thus, a day with a high of 80 and low of 60 has five degree days.) In terms of electric demands, nine days during June the KU load peak was greater than the maximum June, 1974 peak. In fact, on three days this June KU's peak load was greater than the all-time peak of 1,438 megawatts recorded in August, 1973. With hot weather well into July and probably more hot and humid days ahead, KU says it expects to continue taking care of its customers' demands without difficulty, barring unforeseen emergencies.

## Sen. Huddleston to speak at EKU commencement

RICHMOND—U.S. Senator Walter D. Huddleston will be the speaker at Eastern Kentucky University's 68th summer commencement Aug. 7. The program will begin at 8:30 p.m. in the Van Pelt Forum Pavilion. The University will award the honorary doctor of law degree to Huddleston and to Circuit Judge James S. Chenail, Richmond. Dr. Robert R. Martin, EKU president, will present the honorary degree and the academic degrees during the graduation program. Huddleston, a native of Cumberland county, was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1972. He is a former general manager of radio station WELN in Elizabethton. He entered public office by election as state senator in 1962 and was re-elected in 1971.
