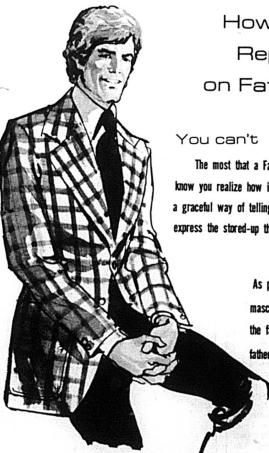

Seminars will be conducted Wednesday and Thursday afternoon, with each delegate selecting four sessions to attend. Seminar topics include: leadership, officer training, arts and crafts, new projects, communications, community pride, project leaders, recreation, personal development, college 4-H clubs, beer tasters, demonstrations and speeches, career exploration, 4-H promotional campaigns, and how to fill out records.
Campaigning for state 4-H offices also will be a major part of the program. Nominations for state offices were made by the different area 4-H groups prior to Kentucky 4-H Week and, at multi-area meetings Wednesday morning, the 4-H'ers will narrow the candidate list to three candidates each for president, vice-president and secretary. Campaign speeches and elections, using voting machines, are scheduled Thursday morning.
Wednesday night's program will be the Kentucky 4-H Fashion Revue, where county 4-H Fashion Revue winners compete for state honors, modeling outfits they made in 4-H clothing project work.
Other highlights of the week include special programs and tours for the adults accompanying the 4-H'ers to Lexington; vesper services conducted by Rev. Marshall Leggett, minister of Lexington's Broadway Christian

Board approves loans

The 29th annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Rural Kentucky Medical Scholarship Fund was held late May. The Board approved 24 loans amounting to \$150,000 to medical students for the coming school year.
There are now 196 physicians in practice in 27 Kentucky counties who have received financial assistance from the Fund, according to G.L. Simpson, M.D., chairman of the Board of Trustees.
Dr. Simpson, in commenting on the outcome of this year's meeting, expressed particular appreciation for the interest and support of Governor Julian M. Carroll, Commissioner William P. McElwain, M.D., and the members of the Kentucky General Assembly.
