General audit approved as School Board meets

The Nicholas County Board of Education approved the school calendar for the 1975-76 school year at the regular meeting Saturday night. School will begin Aug. 25 for the students. School will be out on Labor Day and an in-service day will be held Oct. 20 (Court Day). School will dismiss Dec. 19 for the Christmas holidays and classes will resume Jan. 5. In other business the board approved a bid by Monroe and Associates of Cynthiana to perform a general audit of the books for the system. Superintendent Dan Elder was authorized to advertise for bids for a surface for the playground lot. Chester Bretz was hired on a contract basis to perform maintenance work at the elementary school this summer at a rate of \$300 per month. The board commended Bretz for his maintenance work so far. His duties this summer will include checking the machinery to see if any work is needed before the warranties expire. The board also approved the use of the ballfield by the Nicholas County Ministerial Association for a softball league this summer. At present the field is being used by the Minor League on Mondays and Thursdays and the Women's League on Wednesdays. The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Paul (Dancy) Hampton effective June 5. A building permit for 27,453 addition to the back of the present IGA store was unanimously approved for construction by City Council Monday night. Jerry Rosser of Flemingsburg, the new IGA owner, discussed the immediate plans to completely remodel the store and build the addition. Eventually another addition is planned which will cover the entire property on the left side of the building. Parking for the store will be moved to the right side parking lot. The door will be moved to that side of the store. Dr. W. R. Kingsolver, owner of the building, accompanied Rosser. Other building permits approved are Roscoe Morris, 290 Dorsey Avenue, to tear down and rebuild two rooms in same place; Anna May Henry to relocate. Bids were opened for purchasing used city equipment: G. L. Wills, Paris, bid \$4,854 for distributors; was accepted and Brooks Bussell's bid of \$13,100 for the riding mower was accepted. The city will readvertise in Lexington and Louisville papers for bids on the portable mix plant, 53 dump truck and tractor. These bids were rejected.

The American Legion was granted permission to use the city streets for the Blackberry Festival. Additional police will be hired from Cynthiana for the festival—salaries to be paid equally by Legion and city. Permits was granted to purchase a new desk for the city office. Property Valuation Administrator, Bobby Anderson, was hired to assess the city property for tax purposes. The city will install a grill at the alley behind Henry Bramlett's on Norfolk and redirect the excess water to Ralph Shearer's property where it can better be disposed. Presently it is washing down into Bob Fisher's property and other low lying properties in the area.

Other action taken in which no motions were made are: —Sewer Committee to investigate the sewer sewer stopped up on Sharon Way at request of David McMillan; —City to replace stop sign on McCracken coming onto High Sign at not there anymore, but used to be.
