Albert D. Kirwan by Frank Pating Mathias 106 pages University Press of Kentucky, \$12.50.

Albert D. Kirwan is divided into two parts—his biography in the first section, and his writings and speeches in the last half.

His writings and speeches record additional UK history and Kirwan's love of certain subjects—history, the South, education, athletics, politics, the Civil War, and civil rights.

JUNE IS STILL DAIRY MONTH

Because grazing cows produced more milk in June, National Milk Month was inaugurated in 1937 to sell more dairy products.

The promotion period ran from June 12 to July 10, 1973. But by 1973, the entire month of June was used to "celebrate" Dairy Month. It became a national campaign to remind consumers of the importance of dairy foods in the family diet.

Locally Dairy Week will be celebrated June 16. So for the month of June Kay's Kitchen will be recipes from the United Dairy Industry Association.

BURGER BONANZA 1/2 pounds ground beef 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs 1/2 cup milk 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 8 hamburger buns

Combine meat, crumbs, milk and seasonings; mix lightly. Shape into 8 patties. Broil or grill to desired doneness. Spread bun, as desired, with butter.

BUTTER-BLUE CHEESE SPREAD 1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup crumbled Blue Cheese 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

Combine ingredients. Approximately 1 cup.

CHEESE-BLISS SPREAD 2 packages (1 1/2 oz. each) cream cheese 1 cup pickle relish 1 tablespoon prepared mustard 1/2 cup sliced green onions

Combine softened butter, Blue Cheese and Worcestershire sauce mix until well blended. Approximately 1 cup.

CHEESE-OLIVE SPREAD 1/2 cup dairy sour cream 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese 1/2 cup chopped pimiento-stuffed olives

Combine ingredients. Approximately 1 cup.

UNCOOKED STRAWBERRY JAM Here is an uncooked strawberry jam recipe that you can store in your refrigerator or freezer. It will keep for several months in a refrigerator and a year in a freezer. Once a container is opened, however, you

should use the jam up within a few days. This calls for 3 cups of crushed strawberries, 1 cup of sugar, raspberries, or blueberries, 5 cups of sugar, 1 package of powdered pectin, and 1 cup of water.

Sort and wash full-grown berries. Drain. Remove stems and leaves. Crush berries (green blueberries).

Measure 3 cups of crushed berries into a large mixing bowl. Add sugar, mix well, and let stand for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Dissolve the pectin in the water, bring to a boil for 1 minute. Add pectin solution to the fruit-and-sugar mixture and stir for 2 minutes.

Add the jam to jelly glasses or into suitable freezer containers, leaving 1/2-inch space at the top. Cover the containers and let stand for 24 to 48 hours, or until the jam has set. Then cover jam with 1/8-inch layer of hot paraffin. This makes about nine 6-ounce glasses.

If the jam is too firm, it can be softened by stirring. If it tends to separate, stirring will blend it again. If it is too soft, bring the jam to a boil and it will thicken as it cools.
