

Parks announce outdoor drama season

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What to do in June

June is a month of roses, raspberries, bird's dairy produce and the post. James Russell Lowell, once noted, "perfect days." It is a month when blue-gills and shell crackers bite best in farm ponds and reservoirs seem hungrier in the clear, uncollected creeks flowing out of some parts of the Kentucky mountains.

Unfortunately, June is also a month of old sowburn, peach tree borers, grasshoppers and lawn mowing. The sowburn and borers may take some joy out of life; grasshoppers may cause some complications; and grass cutting can become a chore—don't lose heart. Soil sowburn can be controlled by spraying at intervals with Sevin or Dacton. Follow directions on the label and start spraying about the last week in June. Between July 15-20, spray again, and then again around Aug. 15. This should solve the sowburn problem.

For peach borers, spray peach trees on July 1, Aug. 1, and Sept. 1, or immediately thereafter.

In the matter of lawn mowing, University of Kentucky horticulturists recommend cutting the grass at about two inches, that is, if moisture conditions are favorable. If the rainfall is light, mow in late September when blades so it will cut at a height of about three inches. The resulting grass from such a cut will decompose more slowly than a shorter cut.

June is a rare month indeed—don't make it a month of drudgery. Instead, take a day to go fishing, to eat strawberry shortcake, to get savings (and then to get a new pair of shoes) and the "perfect days" which, no doubt, God made for human enjoyment.

Licking River Basin water quality plan nears completion

FRANKFORT—Soon, Kentucky will send a water quality management plan for the Licking River Basin to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. This plan will provide the basis for all future water quality management efforts in the basin and will help to determine the priorities for spending a portion of the \$90 million that Kentucky will receive this year from the federal government for construction of sewage treatment and collection facilities.

The Licking Basin contains approximately seven per cent of the population and 10 per cent of the land area of Kentucky. It includes all or part of eastern Kentucky counties extending from mountainside Magoffin county to Newport, the basin is primarily rural in character. Major urban concentrations are at Morehead, Winchester, Paris, Cynthia and Elmore.

The Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, assisted by Proctor Davis, Ray and W. E. Gates & Associates, Inc., is now developing the plan, known as a 2021 plan after the section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act which requires it.

The 2021 plan is a new kind of planning effort. Two things make it different. First, other provisions of law require that all public and private sewage treatment plants operate only under certain specified conditions of discharge. And, these conditions must be consistent with the 2021 plan. Second, the 2021 plan, which will be completed soon, are only the first step in a water quality management plan conducted by the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection. Each year this continuing planning process will examine the progress toward meeting the water quality problems of the Licking Basin, and, in the light of environmental, economic, technical, and population growth and development data, determine the best way to take.

Developing a 2021 plan requires the consideration of a wide range of information. Descriptions of existing facilities, characteristics of existing industries, land use, population, employment and a variety of other current and projected data must be put together to display the options and tradeoffs for bringing all the streams of the largest single sum it has ever granted to local research, \$63.8 million.

A major portion of Heart Fund monies goes toward heart research, both on the local and national level, as well as to programs of public and professional education and community service. The annual Heart Fund drive has been the major source of funds for these programs, but in the past several years, the state and municipal contributions such as Smith's have become increasingly significant.
