Carlisle boys find robbery clues; Vaughn tells about stick-up

Five Carlisle boys discovered evidence on Wednesday night, June 18, concerning the robbery of the Farmers Exchange Bank of Millersburg which occurred earlier that day. Mike Sowell, age 12, said that he and Mike Mattox, Curt Mattox, David Young and Mike Webb were camping on the Webb farm on Walnut Grove road in Nicholas County. They were walking along the road when they discovered some torn clothing and \$1,500 worth of travelers checks in the ditch.

State police and the FBI were called to the scene. FBI agents took fingerprints and stated that the bank robbers probably realized that the travelers checks were of no use to them and so got rid of them, along with the clothing. It is possible that the checks can be traced.

The only description available is for the two men who were actually inside the bank. One was said to have long blond hair and weigh approximately 200 pounds. The other was described as thin with brown hair. Both were said to be between 20 and 30 years of age.

Henry Dudley Vaughn, of Carlisle, 20,000 to 30,000 people to participate in a six-day revival featuring continuous preaching, both day and night. Because of the large crowds and the fact that Barton W. Stone founded the Christian religion at Cane Ridge, the site has been preserved by a documentary.

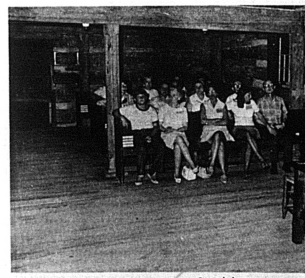

Film crew documents Cane Ridge history

recently to shoot movie footage. The movie, which is a documentary on the frontier revival, is being made as a part of the nation's Bicentennial Celebration.

The dedication service of the Barton Warren Stone Museum at the Cane Ridge Shrine in Bourbon County will be held at 8:00 p.m. on Sunday, June 29. The public is urged to attend. The Cane Ridge Church in Bourbon County and the Concord Church in Nicholas County were built about 1792 at the time Barton W. Stone became the minister of both churches in 1797, a short

time after the separation of the churches for several years. In 1801 a great revival was held at Cane Ridge. It had a tremendous impact on religions throughout the country. From this meeting a new denomination was born which is known as "The Christian Church." The old meeting house, the soundman, and Jack English, the lighting director. Mrs. Dickinson said the bulk of the film was shot at Cane Ridge. It includes scenes inside the old meeting house, which has been preserved by a superstructure erected over it and in the Cane Ridge Cemetery. Mrs. Dickinson also said Campanella narrated part of the film from the actual spot where Stone preached in 1801. The spot was determined by a 1960 study of Stone's autobiography. A copy of the film was promised to Mrs. Dickinson, who said it would be available for use by educational and church groups. The film is scheduled for release in January, 1976.
