Gov. Carroll appoints Cox as special assistant

FRANKFORT—Gov. Julian Carroll Friday announced the appointment of Bill Cox as special assistant for administration. In doing so, Carroll returned Cox to a position as one of his chief advisers.

Cox was chief administrative assistant to Don-L. Gov. Carroll during the time from December, 1971 to December, 1974.

Gov. Carroll said he asked Bill Cox to resign his staff after the Democratic Primary recently. He remarked, "Bill Cox is an excellent administrator. He has the unique talent of quickly understanding a situation and responding with an effective solution without delay."

"With his background as a former employee of the Department of Agriculture and the Bureau of the Budget, his years of service in the Kentucky legislature and as my chief administrative assistant, he has a good understanding of Kentucky state government," Gov. Carroll continued. "Thus, he has the ability to accept major assignments from the governor for evaluation and recommendation for action by the governor."

Cox, having just completed the job as primary campaign chairman for Gov. Carroll, is credited with successfully managing a record-breaking victory for Carroll. He also coordinated Carroll's campaign for lieutenant governor in 1971.

Cox's salary as Gov. Carroll's special assistant for administration will be \$27,000 a year.

Cox is married to the former Edith Ann Pritchett of Madisonville. They have two children, Ann, 18, and Will, 7. Cox attended Eastern Kentucky University and is a 1963 graduate of the University of Kentucky with a major in political science.

GI Bill available early if application prompt

Veterans who plan to attend school for the first time under the GI Bill this summer or fall must act promptly if they want advance payment of educational checks.

The VA says a veteran who plans to enter school should first make certain he has a certificate of eligibility. These may be obtained from the nearest VA office.

The certificate must be presented to the school of the veteran's choice. The school, if it accepts the veteran, will forward it and the enrollment certification on the reverse side to the VA.

Officials explained if the agency receives this information at least 30 days before registration, veterans who train half time or more may pick up their first check when they register. The first check will cover training allowances for the first two months, or one month and a portion of a month,

Water operators get a new deal

Kentucky's 1,400 water operators will be licensed to work in most other states when proposed water certification regulations are adopted.

The reciprocity represents part of the new deal for the state's 1,400 water treatment operators and 780 water treatment plant and water distribution system plant operators under the revised regulations. The regulations require incorporation into state certification examinations several guidelines recommended by the Association of Boards of Certification, an international organization whose certification standards are accepted by most states.

This modification was only one of a public hearing by the division of sanitary engineering in the Kentucky Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection. Other changes involved legal reference changes, classification restructuring and de-

finitive rewording.

Additional modifications include a review of the duties of the board and the addition of special designation sections.

Only one person voiced concern over any of the regulations. Questioning the reclassification of water distribution operators and the provisions for enforcing different types of operators at plants, Dennis Feback of the Kentucky Department for Transportation asked if an operator would still hold the same class license as before.

Under the proposed revisions, the state's regulations are more in line with guidelines set by the certification

boards association. State sanitary engineering officials said that with the exception of those they believed were not beneficial to Kentucky, many of the association's guidelines were incorporated into the state's regulations.
