Hagan, state geologist and director of the Kentucky Geological Survey at the University of Kentucky in Lexington. Millersburg quadrangle, covering part of Boone, Harrison and Nicholas counties is one of them. Other geologic maps are of: —Cave-in-Rock quadrangle in Crittenden county; —Dukes quadrangle in Pulaski county; —Fairfield quadrangle, covering parts of Nelson and Spencer counties; —Frazier quadrangle, covering parts of Pulaski and Wayne counties; —Livingston quadrangle, covering parts of Rockcastle and Laurel counties; —Mintonsville quadrangle, covering parts of Casey and Pulaski counties; —New Richmond quadrangle in Campbell county; and —Whitaker quadrangle and part of the Wolf Island quadrangle, covering parts of Hickman and Fulton counties.

690 veterans in Nicholas

Nicholas county has a total of 690 veterans, according to a Veterans Administration accounting for 1974. In the State of Kentucky there were 460,000 veterans from all wars at the beginning of this year. Vietnam era veterans account for 90.00 of the total and from the Korean War there are 10,000. World War II, 1,200,000 men and women who served between the Korean and Vietnam Conflicts. In Nicholas county, the VA estimates there are 130 veterans from Vietnam; 130 from Korea; 200 from World War II; 30 from World War I, and 10 who served between Korea and Vietnam. Kentucky also has 24 veterans of the Spanish American War.

MSU golf tourney set

MOREHEAD—The eighth annual Morehead State University Golf Tournament will be played July 4-6 at the MSU Course. The tournament format consists of a championship flight of unlimited size and the first flight of 16 players and additional flights of eight persons each. The championship flight will consist of medal play with other flights using match play. Each player is guaranteed 54 holes of golf. 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UK's Beef Cattle Day scheduled for July 10

When it comes to raising beef cattle, there is nothing new these days! Well, how about finishing cattle on grass, treating hay with preservatives to reduce curing time, using an electronic system to detect when the cow is ready for calving, and using a laser beam to locate the cow's position in the pasture? You can learn about these and many other new ideas in beef cattle production by visiting the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture's Beef Cattle Day on Thursday, July 10. The day will take place at UK's Coldstream and Main Chance Farms, located just north of Lexington on Newlawn Pike near 175. Beef Cattle Day will get underway at 9 a.m. The morning session will feature demonstrations, exhibits, and presentations by UK researchers and Extension personnel. A program of speakers is scheduled for the afternoon, and one of the speakers will be Gordon Van Vleck, president of the American National Cattlemen's Association. Other afternoon speakers will be George E. Mitchell Jr., coordinator of UK's beef cattle research program; Virgil Hays, chairman of the Department of Animal Sciences at UK; and M.B. Wiebe, chairman of the Department of Animal Science at Virginia Tech University. During the morning session, one of the presentations at Coldstream Farm will deal with grass as a feed source which can cause the death of a highly productive cow in about three weeks. Curt Absher will present the results of a survey showing the scope of the

deficiency problem in Kentucky. He will also discuss current letany research and recommendations for the prevention of the disease. Does it pay to apply nitrogen fertilizers to pastures? How does the time of the calving season affect the way pastures should be managed? These and other questions relating to pasture and animal management will be discussed by Dale Lewis. Machines for making hay stacks and large round bales will be displayed at Coldstream Farm. Neil will discuss the storing and feeding of large hay packages, and feeding panels for controlling waste when feeding the preservatives to reduce curing time and prevent spoilage, and a baler equipped with a device for applying preservative to hay will be on display. John T. Johns of UK will talk about the feed requirements of replacement heifers for the beef cow herd. He will explain how to feed heifers before and after their first calving to improve their health and productivity. Three other UK speakers will give presentations at Coldstream Farm during the morning session. Dan Miksch will discuss health programs to prevent low productive performance. Ron Redwald will talk about bull selection, fertility testing, crossbreeding, and calf survival. Darnest Absher will discuss pregnancy testing and heat detection, and will demonstrate

the experimental electronic heat detection system he has developed. On Main Chance Farm, Neil Bradley will give a presentation on finishing beef cattle, with emphasis on finishing systems in which cattle are kept on grass. Exhibits in this area will show four finishing systems, and cattle types selected for various finishing systems. Jim Kemp will show meat from the carcasses of animals finished with some of these systems. In addition, he will discuss the U.S.D.A. beef carcass grading system and its relation to the Kentucky beef cattle industry. J. Kenneth Evans will describe the progress in pasture renovation research at UK. The experimental pasture renovating machine developed by UK agricultural engineers and agronomists will be demonstrated. This machine is capable of renovating with one pass over the field, seeding in a legume and applying a contact herbicide to suppress grass growth. Also at Main Chance Farm, Don Lalor will talk about preconditioning calves. J.A. Boling will discuss rationing for growing calves through the winter. Fred Thait will discuss plunkage prevention and treatment, and Chris Christensen will describe and demonstrate methods of controlling flies on beef cattle. Approximately 5,400 lives were lost in home fires during 1973.

INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The NICHOLAS County tax assessment has been approved by the Department of Revenue, Frankfort, Kentucky.

The tax roll will now be open for inspection during the period July 7 thru JULY 11, 1975 under the supervision of the Property Valuation Administrator or one of his deputies.

Any property owner may inspect the tax roll to check the assessment of his property and compare it with the assessment of comparable property to determine whether it is equitably assessed. The tax roll may not be inspected for any other purpose.

This is the January 1, 1975 assessment on which State, County and School taxes for 1975 will be due in September 1975.

The tax roll is in the office of the Property Valuation Administrator on the 2nd floor of the Nicholas County courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:30 A.M. and 4:00 P.M.

Any taxpayer aggrieved by their assessment may appeal to the local tax appeals board as provided by KRS 133.120(1).

A letter or petition stating the reason for appeal shall be filed with the County Clerk during the week the tax roll is open for inspection.
