Land-contest subject in Sept.

"LAND—My Country's Heritage: Yesterday, today and tomorrow" will be the subject of the 1975 Conservation Essay Contest and the 1975 Jim Claypool Conservation Poster Contest sponsored by the Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times.

The annual competitions, open to all Kentucky elementary and high school students, may be the largest conservation-oriented contests for school children in the United States. In 1974, 72,260 essays were written on "Water Conservation—Its Effect on My Community." 31,700 posters were made on the subject.

The essay contest is in its 22nd year, and over 12 million essays have been written by students on various essay contest subjects since its inception. 1975 was the first year for the poster contest. Then, it was simply called the Conservation Poster Contest. It was renamed the Jim Claypool Conservation Poster Contest last year in honor of the late James H. Claypool who was a field representative for the Kentucky Division of Conservation and a former director of the division.

Claypool worked with the Louisville newspapers for 26 years on the essay contest and was instrumental in the initiation of the poster contest. He died in 1974. The poster competition is open to students in grades one through five. In it, students are asked to make original posters with the subject of the competition as the theme of the posters. Awards of \$175 in U.S. Savings will be awarded to three state winners by the two Louisville daily newspapers. Winners in 121 districts will receive plaques.

In the essay contest, students in grades six through 12 are asked to write essays of no more than 1,000 words, and the top award winners—121 district winners and three state winners—receive \$3,825 in savings bonds from the Louisville newspapers.

Copies of the contests, along with The Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times, are the Kentucky Association of Conservation Districts and the Kentucky Department of Education. The 1975 competition will begin in September. Detailed information and reference material for the two contests will be sent to the principals of all schools in Kentucky at that time.
