Sidetracking reduces nitrogen fertilizer for farm crops in short supply and expensive. . . .

Does it pay to apply nitrogen fertilizer to pasture? How does the time of the calving season affect the pasture? Should it be managed?

Another alternative is to broadcast dry nitrogen over growing corn. . . .

Most Nicholas county farmers are also sidetracking their tobacco with nitrogen. It is important to get the nitrogen on early in the growing period so the supply will be used by the crop prior to ripening.

When it comes to raising beef cattle, there is nothing new these days? Well, how about finishing cattle on grass, treating hay with preservatives to reduce curing time, using an electronic device to detect cows in heat, and renovating pastures in a once-over operation?
