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County road program announced

FRANKFORT—Governor Julian M. Carrill and newly appointed Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts have announced the 1975-76 Rural Secondary Program for Nicholas county. The county's anticipated share of Rural Secondary funds for the year beginning July 1 is \$154,662.

Roberts expected that the program selected provides maintenance for 42.2 miles of Rural Secondary roads. It also authorizes planning and construction of a drainage structure and approaches on KY 22, the Carlisle-Cynthiana Road.

The Rural Secondary Program is supported by two cents of the Commonwealth's motor fuel tax, first originated in 1948 when the General Assembly recognized the need to improve farm-to-market and other rural roads. To insure fair distribution among the various counties, it enacted a statutory formula in 1965. This formula, which takes rural population, rural area, and rural road mileage into account, determines each county's share.

John White represents county in Wedco group

John White represented Nicholas county at the Educational Conference sponsored by the Kentucky Association of Milk, Food and Environmental Sanitarians held last week in Louisville. He was one of seven representatives attending the Wedco District Conference. The conference was conducted to study such areas as water pollution, air pollution, food service codes, sewage treatment plants, animal disease programs, aseptic packaging of milk and milk products and solid waste pollution.

Herman D. Regan, Director of Bureau for Environmental Quality of the state outlined aspects of Public Law 92-500 passed in October 1972. Its main objective is the maintenance of the quality of water consistent with safety. Utilization of funds that are available to the number one priority will be upgrading waste treatment facilities. The Federal goal set 1985 as being the target date so that discharging pollutants into water be eliminated; 1980 all navigable waters will be safe for fish and recreational purposes. Under this law some monies are available for water sewage and intercepter lines as well as sewer collector lines. The program is administered with 75% grant money with the remaining coming from municipalities. He reflected that priority is given to high density areas but that any governmental agency with a need is eligible. The program plan under Section 106 is a prerequisite for entitlement to funding. Hearings must always be held in both the planning and implementation stages.
